Many stockmen have on their hands, stock which have passed the age when they were the best suited for market, the low prices offered having caused many to hold onto them. In hope some thing would turn up which would result in a little better price. The prospects for taking much of the stock thru the winter, and selling when fat next year, at a price which will pay for the winter feed and show a profit to the producer, look very unfavorable at this time.

The price of hogs while quite good during the early part of the season, did not give many hog raisers a chance to take advantage of them. At this season of the year, pigs that are grown during the summer have attained about the right age and size to be placed onto the market. The present low price, does not give much chance for converting grains into hogs.
