SHAKERS OF NEW ENGLAND GIVE UP COMMUNITY LIFE

ENFIELD, N. H. (AP)—The five last members of the local Community of Shakers, established here originally in 1827, will abandon the settlement this winter and move over to Canterbury, where there is a similar colony. Death has reduced the group from about 150 to those last remaining, who, today are about to close the barns and lock the doors for the last time. In 1856 the membership of the Enfield colony was about the same as at the beginning, but for 27 years it has steadily dwindled. Outlying was obligatory. This epidemic raised garden produce, wool and roots and manufactured, umbrellas, ironing, pulps and wooden articles of various kinds. In keeping with the laws of the sect, all property was held on a community basis, and the men and women members lived separate lives of stern discipline awaiting the "Second Coming of Christ."

PHYSICIANS PRESENT AT MEETING

Twentieth Annual Meeting of Oregon State Board of Health Held.

HOT LAKE (Special)—An Eastern Oregon member of the state board of health, Dr. W. B. Phy, attended the twentieth annual meeting of this organization in Portland last week. As a Grande Ronde valley hunter, he spent upon this section of the state when asked to speak on "Eastern Oregon" at a luncheon Friday noon. With members of the board of health as their guests, the Portland city club were hosts at this affair. More than 250 were present and were addressed by members of the board.

This function followed a morning business meeting of the board and in turn possessed their convening at the state governor's board, Governor Walter M. Pierce and other prominent Oregonians joined the body of physicians for dinner at the Portland hotel in the evening. Dr. Phy was appointed one of the committee of three to which the question of whether or not the social disease division shall take over the activities of the social hygiene society was referred.

Cooling off a town and its surrounding countryside is the business of William Schiefer, recently arrived at the Hot Lake sanatorium. Schiefer operates an ice plant in Kellogg, Ida. He chooses this time of the year to take treatment as the falling of the snow in the hills around Kellogg makes a ton of ice go a long way in December. RUMANIA TURNING EAGERLY TO OIL POSSIBILITIES

BUCHAREST (AP)—Oil is one of the big factors in Rumania's dominant position in the Balkans, and the government's decision to develop the oilfields with the aid of foreign capital will open up, it is hoped, big economic possibilities for the nation.

Economic necessity is now proving of greater concern to Rumania than political alliances and the practicing of sound theories, such as maximum prices, export taxes and other restrictions at the expense of foreign capital employed in the development of the country's resources.

Rumania today has title to vast areas of rich oil-bearing lands, which have been leased so far only in small lots to purely Rumanian companies. The government now apparently realizes that the best interests of the country demand that these state-owned lands be continuously developed and plans have been drawn up for drilling 3,000 wells on them during the next ten years, provided, of course, that foreign capitalists can be induced to come in and "carry the load."

Great Britain, and more particularly France, if only for political consideration, would like to extend their hold on the Rumanian fields, but it is felt here that American participation, which would presumably be entirely non-political in character, would be preferable.

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FOREIGN-BORN POPULATION INCREASING IN SOUTHWEST

WASHINGTON (AP)—The center of foreign-born population of the country is located in Allen county, Indiana, 10.5 miles east of New Haven, having taken a south-westward trend after two decades of southward movement. In determining the foreign-born center, the census bureau found it had moved 18.5 miles in the ten years from 1919 to 1929. Its movement was 11.5 miles eastward and 15 miles southward.

"The change in direction of the movement of this center from east to west is due principally to the increase in foreign-born white population in the state of California," says the bureau. "The total increase in the foreign-born white population of the United States was 267,299 and the increase in the states of Texas, California and Arizona was 216,222, or 86 per cent of the total increase."
