WILL TAKE VOTERS' NAMES FROM LIST

ENTERPRISE.—John P. Tobin, county clerk, and H. G. Evans, deputy, spent the last week going over the records of voters in the county. They found that out of 3000 registered voters in Walla Walla county 1200 had failed to cast a ballot for the last four years.

It is provided in the law that should a voter fail to cast a ballot for two elections that he shall be notified of the fact and his name dropped from the list of registered voters if a reply is not received in ten days.

The clerk's office has been working on a margin of four years and has checked off the names of those who have failed to vote in that time. Cards informing them of the fact will be mailed to all on the list. If these cards are returned within ten days the voter is automatically re-registered. If the card is not returned within the time set, the name is taken from the poll list and the person is no longer a registered voter in the county. One trouble with this is that these persons still can swear their votes in, election day, when there often is a rush of these careless voters who seek to get back on the poll list.

WOMAN TRIES TO COMMIT SUICIDE

JOSEPH.—A sad affair occurred on Peoria creek the first of last week when Ruth Downs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Downs, suddenly became mentally unbalanced and attempted suicide by jumping in a well. The first intimation the family had of the young woman's condition was in the evening when she left the house rather hurriedly without any wraps on. The weather was cold and it struck Mrs. Downs rather peculiar that Ruth should go out that way. Mr. Downs stepped out of the house in time to see the girl start in the direction of the well and put her feet on the curb. Mrs. Downs reached the well in time to grab at her clothing but she threw herself over with such force that she was unable to hold her. Realizing the hopelessness of getting her out by himself, Mr. Downs went to the home of his son for help. The two men were unable to get the girl out, as she refused to help herself and other neighbors were called to the rescue. It was necessary for one of the men to go down in the well and raise the girl out of the water high enough to place a rope under her arms before she could be pulled out. But for the fact that the water was comparatively shallow she surely would have drowned.

A medical examination was held and the unfortunate girl was committed to the state hospital on Wednesday.

Engineers Contract
For Big Skyscraper
CLEVELAND (AP)—The contract for the new Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers \$4,000,000 twenty-story office building, at the southwest corner of St. Clair avenue and Ontario street, has been awarded and the work of erecting the building now on the site is under way. The contract calls for completion of the work in 24 months.

The Brotherhood Building Company will construct the building. It will be of steel, with white exterior, similar to the present engineers building on the opposite corner, which is owned by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.
