13,313 CHILDREN IN SAVINGS PLAN

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—The public school savings plan, a system inaugurated here in 1901 by one of the local banks, which enables students to deposit money through their individual schools, has enjoyed a steady growth since its inception and at the present time a total of 13,313 children are enrolled as members, according to reports recently made public.

The entire amount on deposit has reached \$115,000, the statement said, which averages \$4.45 for each depositor. Increases for September, October and November of this year have surpassed any similar period.

Three of the schools leading in deposits, turn in weekly amounts ranging from \$40 down to \$20. Under the plan now in operation, the children hand their deposits to their teachers, who turn them over to the principal and he forwards them to the bank, where the amounts are credited to each individual account.

Indians Consider the Smallpox a Necessary Evil—Visiting Often

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP)—Smallpox is a necessary evil in the minds of the Yakima Indians, according to H. N. Cassidy, deputy health officer of Yakima county. Mr. Cassidy had just made a visit to the reservation to investigate reports that the disease had attacked several Indians. He found only one case, a mild one, and was unable to locate them.

The disease, Mr. Cassidy said, has visited the Indians so often that they now accept it with resignation. They hesitate to report cases to the health officers, according to the doctor, and seem reticent when it is suggested that a physician be summoned.

CHURCHES TO USE RADIO

CHICAGO (By the Associated Press)—To disseminate more widely the religious teachings of Christian churches, radio broadcasting is soon to be undertaken by many of the larger denominations, according to an article in the forthcoming issue of the Radio Digest. The magazine sets out that active steps already have been taken by several Christian churches to utilize radio communication as a means of reaching millions of persons who might have no other contact with the religion.

"The Vatican will, in a few months, adopt radio to spread the word of the pope to millions of persons over the world," the article declared. "Due to efforts of a company headed by Guglielmo Marconi, radio inventor, a broadcasting station may soon be operated in the Vatican."

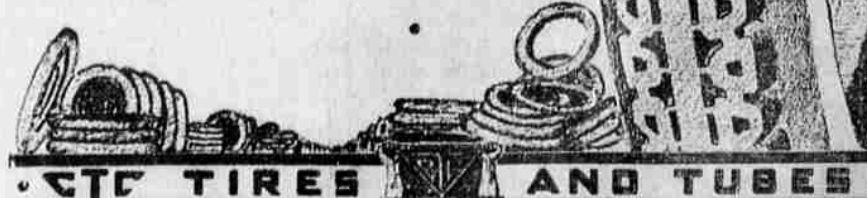
