OHIO ENDORSES COOLIDGE FOR '24 NOMINATION

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—The Republican party in Ohio Friday officially went on record favoring the nomination of President Coolidge for president by the national convention at Cleveland in June.

Indorsement of the president was made at a meeting of the state central committee here at conference headquarters presided over by State Chairman Charles W. Montgomery of Newark. The indorsement was said to have been unanimous by Chairman Montgomery, though some of the committee men were not present. Mr. Montgomery said they previously had given their assent to indorsement.

STAND OF HENRY FORD DEPLORED

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—The Associated Press—The board of directors of the Ford Motor Co. Thursday afternoon adopted a resolution deploring Henry Ford's action in declining to be a candidate for the presidency.

The resolution asserts Ford "deserves the cause of the people and aligns himself with the most reactionary thought in American politics."

PUT NATION AHEAD OF SELF, IS URGE

ST. CLAIRSVILLE, Ohio, (INS)—The phrase, "When in doubt, vote No. 1," is a "boy man's slogan," according to Robert R. Bechtel, of Ohio, former speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives, addressing the Community club here.

The vote on many of the referendums since Ohio adopted the initiative and referendum amendment to its State Constitution "does not speak well for this State," Bechtel said.

Voicing fear of consequences resulting from selfishness, he said: "The good American is one who puts his country ahead of himself. He is for his State first, rather than his class or group. He is an American before he is a lawyer, doctor, merchant, farmer, banker, mechanic or laborer. The great incentive to good government is the selfish desire of individuals."

"Every voter who is not busy should have for his slogan: 'Get informed.' No one loses his vote unless he fails to vote his honest convictions. The good American will serve on the school board or anywhere else he is called upon," said Bechtel.

FRENCH YOUTH IGNORANT OF WAR HISTORY

PARIS.—The World War lasted seven years, was waged by the "Allies," Russia, Serbia and Poland against Germany, and the treaty of peace was signed in Metz.

Those were a few of the surprising answers to intelligence test questions turned in by some of the 800 nineteen-year-old recruits of the 1923 military class called to the colors last month from the northeastern section of France, including the devastated regions.

Others suggested the peace treaty was signed in Lille or Berlin. Very few were able to name the presidents of the French Republic since its foundation. One recruit claimed Joan of Arc was an English queen. Another, who had never heard of the battle of Waterloo, was of the opinion that Napoleon had conquered England.

The tests produced other surprises. Only 200 of the 800 men had received good education. Four hundred could read and write, making many mistakes. One hundred apparently knew how to write, but scribbled in such a manner that their output was indecipherable. The other 100 men were absolutely illiterate.

Officers conducting the tests suggested that the coming of the recruits from the devastated regions accounted for the fact they didn't know anything about the war and other French history. Many of the recruits, ten and eleven years old when the war broke out, received no instruction whatsoever during the four years of the war.
