ception of increases in the police, fire and judicial departments. The ordinance calls for an increase of the municipal judge's salary from \$40 per month to \$50, and increase of \$5 per month in the salaries of all firemen, police and also the water superintendent. Providing the ordinance passes at next meeting, these increases will become a fact.

Clint Haynes, chief of police, appeared before the commission last evening with the recommendation that the rooming house license granted Mrs. Hartley be revoked, due to the finding, by the police, of evidences that gambling had been carried on in certain rooms in her rooming establishment. Mrs. Hartley, present in person, gave reasons why she thought the license not be revoked. The matter was laid on the table until next Wednesday evening.

Monthly reports of the police department, fire department, city recorder and the weekly report of the city manager was read and approved. Only one fire occurred during the month of December, with no damage resulting from same.

A petition for a license to operate a dancing school at Rex Hall was presented by Mrs. Fred J. Wells, who stated in the petition that she wished to pay the six months' fee by weekly installments. This provision was not viewed favorably by the commissioners who felt that permitting her to pay in this manner would be breaking a precedent that was not justifiable. The commission agreed to give her the license she desired upon the consideration that she pay the fee at the time of granting the license.

Another interesting communication was read to the commission, tendered by the owner of the house in which Ernest Houston and his family are living. Mr. Houston's family is quarantined due to scarlet fever existing within the house and the owner desires that the city pay Mr. Houston's rent inasmuch as he was to give up the house a short time ago but was forced to remain due to the quarantine being placed there. The city took no action on the matter, feeling that it was not their fault that the rent was not paid and that they would not be justified in paying for same under existing conditions.

Al Watkins, colored, convicted of maintaining a common nuisance at the residence at 1426 S. avenue in which he lived, who has appealed his conviction to the circuit court, entered a request for

a conditional parole, providing the city would dismiss his appeal and release his bondsmen. The request was tendered by Watkins' attorney, P. S. Ivanhoe.

According to Colonel Ivanhoe, Watkins is to be ejected from his home today and no other homes in La Grande are open to him and he wishes to leave town, probably to go to Pendleton, Oregon. Watkins, who appealed, is willing to withdraw his appeal and leave town, providing the city give him a parole conditioned so that if Watkins ever returned to La Grande again the parole would be revoked and he be made to

pay his fine.
