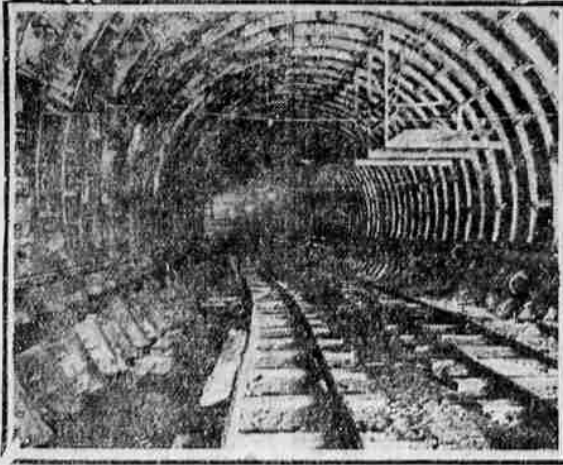

BELOW ZERO—Of whom do you think when you think of the Eastern Oregon Light and Power company? Do you think of the lineman? Do you think of his hazardous work—so hazardous that he cannot buy life insurance—as you see him high on the pole at work? When you see him, it is likely to be fair weather. Do you know that he is subject to call at anytime, summer or winter, in the day or night—during fair or foul weather? Below zero and the wind howling. It is dark. You are snug in a warm home, reading by electric light. Trouble is reported on the system of the Light and Power company. Wind has swept over a section of transmission line. The trouble call comes to the lineman and he turns out. The crew drives through the icy blast to the place where trouble is reported. A pole has snapped and a tangled mass of wire lies twisted in the snow. Into immediate action goes the crew. The pole is erected and after the wires have been spliced on the ground—up goes the lineman on the pole. He has to be careful—so careful—that he cannot move. He might slip and come in contact with live wires, which might mean instant death. His hands are so numb with cold that he can scarcely use his pliers. Fingers, feet and ears freeze first. The biting wind blows flying snow against his face. Slow work and cold—but finally he has again placed the line in service. Do you think of him as you sit comfortably at home, using your electric lights? Why does the lineman undergo this hardship? To give you service—a service that must not fail.
