PRESENT DAY FOOD IS BEST

BERKELEY, Cal. (U.S.A.)—The things "that mother used to make" may not have been the best for the children's constitutions, as a result of recent researches in the field of nutrition, according to Dr. A. F. Morgan, of the Household Science Department of the University of California. In generations before when children had indigestion, rickets and even scurvy and bowed legs, poor health and diseases resulted, mothers never thought of attributing these things to their method of feeding their families. During the last ten years there have been great researches into the causes of these things, and it has been proven that unbalanced meals and food of poor quality have been much to blame.

Dr. Morgan says that women are learning more and more about how to cook for their families. This progress is due to more people obtaining better educations today, to an increase of thought on the problem in this century and to more knowledge on the subject itself.

Dr. Morgan declares that cooking technique itself isn't improving, and perhaps our grandmothers cooked as well as women do today, but that the majority of women are becoming more intelligent in the choice of food and in the preparation of balanced as well as attractive meals. Another factor in the improvement of home cooking is the wider variety of food that is available now, especially in California.

"Every meal in the day does not have to be exactly balanced," says Dr. Morgan, "so long as a proper balance is maintained in the total meals of a day or two. Of course, it is better to maintain a balance throughout every meal, if possible, and thus balance the work which has to be done by the body."

The importance of nutrition has only recently been realized, Dr. Morgan says. She said that the increase in knowledge of how food should be prepared and served will help to build up the race.

In Dr. Morgan's opinion nutrition is important because, like every other science, it teaches the scientific method and also is for the good of the human race and leads to better feeding of families.

WOULD CHANGE IT TO PARENTS' DAY

BOSTON, (U.S.A.)—A movement designed to make the second Sunday in May Parents' Day was launched here recently.

Mothers' Day has been celebrated in May heretofore for several years, but it got an unsavory odor, according to backers of the movement, who charge that florists were "sneaking" the public for flowers for that particular Sunday.

According to two men—"Uncle Robert" and "Brother Ed"—who declined to give their names, it is proposed to replace Mothers' Day with Parents' Day.

"The idea," said "Uncle Robert" in a statement, "is to establish a day of remembrance that would be clean, pure and devotional. In the matter of gifts, this should be open to all merchants, who would be expected to offer goods at a price within the reach of the pennies of small children. So far as the florists are concerned, there would be no idea whatever of establishing any particular flower as the emblem of the day. On the contrary, any flower or pot plant offered within a reasonable price would be in order. Trade marks or insignia don't mean devotion; but true love with sincerity, comes from the heart. Little children save your pennies to buy something for your parents. Daughters, make something of your own handiwork for the home. Sons, give something as a remembrance to show your love and gratitude."

"Uncle Robert" showed a letter from Governor Parker, of Louisiana, endorsing his undertaking. He also showed a statement from the Commissioner of Education of New York State giving the movement his approval.
