

Local News In Brief

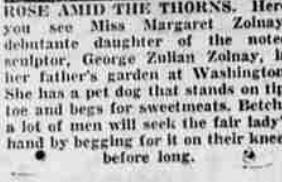

It was learned that they were not outside and by this time the house was a seething furnace. Fire fighters arrived and subdued the flames and after effecting an entrance, they found the charred remains of Mrs. G. M. Tucker and baby Grant in the bedroom. Mrs. Tucker was by the edge of the bed with her burned arms outstretched toward the child who was lying on the bed. Other members of the family injured were Mrs. Ben Tucker, wife of a brother of G. M. Tucker, who was very painfully burned about the shoulders and arms as she escaped from the burning building and Hester Tucker, another niece, who escaped comparatively unharmed. G. M. Tucker himself is seriously injured although it is not believed that he is dangerously hurt.

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WHITES THRIVE IN WARM LAND

Medical Opinion Thwarts Assertion That Caucasians Can't Stand Tropics.

SYDNEY, N. S. W. (AP)—Medical opinion has done something toward settling the controversy that has raged around the question of whether the northern portions of the Australian continent are suitable for settlement by the white race. The discussion was apropos of the Australian "white policy," under which all colored races are excluded except persons who were domiciled here prior to the legislation, and a few admitted under special trade agreements.

Advocates of the introduction of cheap colored labor on an indenture system, or contracts for periods of years, have contended that northern Australia, being tropical, afforded a climate for which white men were constitutionally unfitted. To exclude races able to develop in this territory was, they argued, a dog-in-the-manger policy. But medical opinion now says white people not only can live in the tropical north, but thrive there. A recent pamphlet issued by the Commonwealth Health Department stated that after a generation's trial it fairly could be said that white men could work in the tropical areas of Australia without the labor of colored races. In this tropical life, it was added, the British were holding their own with other white races. In the centers of population as far north as Townsville, men of British, nationally predominant overwhelmingly. In the tropical sugar districts northward, there are numbers of Italians and smaller numbers of Greeks, Spaniards, Rouman, Maltese and other nationalities. The Eastern races are represented chiefly by Chinese, once present in considerable numbers, and in lesser degree by Japanese and by natives of India.
