Joe Ross and Alvin Watson are working in La Grande this week.

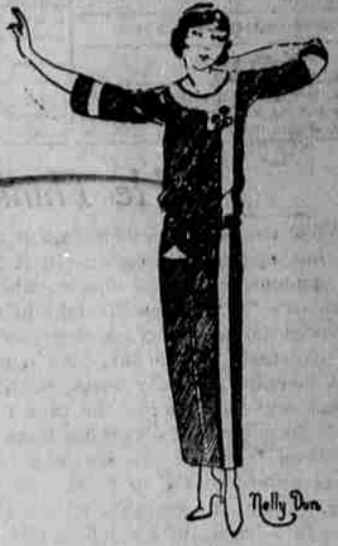

CONVENTION TO SEEK SOLUTION CRIME PROBLEMS

DETROIT (AP)—Means toward the solution of criminal problems will be further discussed at the annual meeting here January 11-12 of the American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology, according to James Bronson Reynolds, president, who will report on progress in the work.

Other features of the program will be reports by the committee on criminal records and statistics and on surveys made in other fields. Prof. F. B. Crossley of the Northwestern University School of Law will speak on the

former subject, augmented by first hand information gathered by Prof. Samuel B. Warner of the University of Oregon.

The Institute has been enabled to function in regard to records and statistics through the generosity of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and the work of the survey committee is supported by the aid of the Carnegie corporation, according to Mr. Reynolds.
