Superintendent Re-Elected. HOOD RIVER, Or.—The city school board re-elected A. M. Cannon as school superintendent for a three-year period. Mr. Cannon, who is now serving his fourth year here is the first superintendent ever to pay off any of the bonded indebtedness. The district had reached its limit with \$129,900 outstanding. Since then \$43,000 had been paid off, and yet the school tax has decreased in the four years from 25.5 to 22 mills. Judge A. J. PRE-WAR GOLD STANDARD HELD WHAT IS NEEDED

EDINBURGH, (AP)—Addressing the Bankers' Institute here recently, Sir Charles Adair, a Director of the Bank of England and chairman of the House of Commons and the House of Lords, made a strong plea for return of the gold standard as existing before the war. Upon the issue of the conflict which swung round this project he said, might depend whether Great Britain was to remain her former supremacy as the financial center of the world, or was to slide to the level of a second-class power. After reviewing the pre-war standard system Sir Charles said the conditions precedent to its restoration were a cessation of government borrowing, the effective use of the Bank of England's rate of discount and the legal limitation of fiduciary note issues. It could not be too widely known, he said, that such was the official British monetary policy. Dealing with the charge that the official monetary policy was a main cause of the existing trade depression and unemployment and an impediment to recovery, he asked "Has any substantial relation of the nature of cause and effect been established between the currency
