### ASSESSOR BOOSTS ATLANTA'S REALTY

ATLANTA, Ga., (INS)—An increase of \$50,000,000 in the assessed value of Atlanta real estate will appear on the books of the city tax assessors as soon as the work of assessing property can be completed, it was announced recently by members of the Assessor's Board.

This is the greatest increase recorded in any single year of Atlanta's history, it was stated. Assessed value of real estate for 1922, upon which 1923 taxes were predicated, amounted to \$208,000,000. The \$50,000,000 increase thus marked a gain for the year of approximately 25 per cent.

One of these, he said, was the vast amount of new construction which is to appear on the city tax books for the first time. The other was due to the application in part of the so-called scientific basis of assessment, which fixes standardized value of properties within certain districts and on certain streets.

### MAKE STADIUM IN OLD CRATER

HONOLULU, (AP)—Punchbowl, the large extinct crater of one of the volcanoes that formed the island of Oahu and which once was used as a hill of sacrifice by the Hawaiian people, will become one of the largest athletic stadiums in the world if the plans of Major William Hoopai, athletic officer of the Hawaiian National Guard, are consummated.

The stadium would be almost in the center of the city and would have a seating capacity of 95,000, as large as the present population of the city. Prison laborers have started clearing kavae and other brush from the sides of the crater inside the bowl. Improvements also have been started to the one road leading to the top of the crater and efforts will be made to obtain municipal co-operation for the construction of another road.

Punchbowl, which towers 500 feet above sea level, forms a perfect amphitheatre and, in the opinion of Major Hoopai, could be transformed into a modern stadium at small cost. It is now owned by the government and is used as a rifle range for the National Guard of Hawaii. Its peak is the scene of the annual Easter sunrise service, which is held before a giant cross.

The last human sacrifice believed to have taken place on Punchbowl is shrouded in mystery, but tradition says that King Kamehameha IV, a heavy drinker, drank his only child during a drinking bout. The child received injuries which caused his death. Kamehameha planned an expedition of 1818. A decree was issued ordering all inhabitants of Honolulu to remain inside their houses at night. What transpired is unknown, but tradition continues that a fire

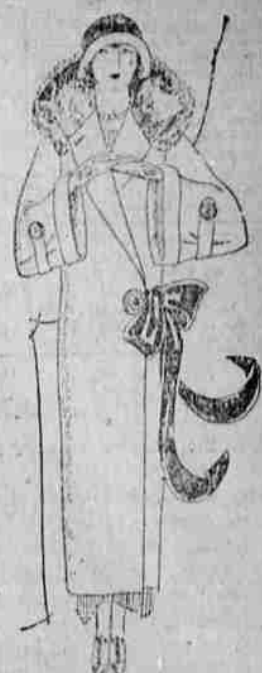

### TRAVEL URGED FOR COLLEGES

Marcus H. Marks Asks Cooperation of World Colleges To Establish Travel Course.

NEW YORK, (AP)—Co-operation among the colleges of the world to establish an official course of travel and study in foreign countries, was the subject of an address delivered in this city by Marcus H. Marks of New York, before the fourth annual meeting of the Association of American Colleges.

The ultimate hope for a real world peace lies in international education, and the colleges of the world may well take an active and united interest in the development, Mr. Marks argued. "In a relatively small way," he continued, "the advantages of travel abroad have been long recognized; groups of students have been coming and going; privately organized travel bureaus are multiplying; several colleges have adopted official courses in other countries; but to secure the desired, far-reaching result, the colleges of the world should formally cooperate to develop the idea of international travel, including recognized courses of study, and bring their united experience to bear on the great work; foreign travel and study should become not an at present a sporadic

British Admiralty Experiments With Plant Tablet for Scoury  
LONDON, (AP)—The British Admiralty is experimenting with a new extract in tablet form, of watercress, spinach and other green plants, called phyllosan, which may supersede lime juice for the treatment of scurvy.

Phyllosan is the discovery of Professor E. Buerger of Berne University. It is made from chlorophyll, the vital fluid in plants which bears a close chemical relationship to human blood pigments. Several patients in London hospitals have been rejuvenated by a course of Professor Buerger's application.

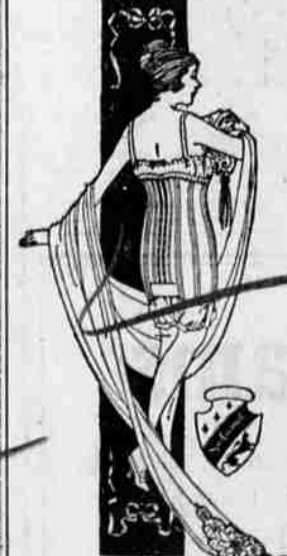
