La Grande, with its many adjacent hunting grounds, has always been known as a "dog town" and a permit of the license issued from the recorder's office in 1923 shows that the licensed dogs in La Grande during the past year amounted to a total of half a hundred. Prices last year were: male \$1, female \$2.

## EAKIN TALKS TO MEN'S CLUB

One of the most interesting discourses delivered in La Grande in a long time was that of Robert Eakin yesterday at the Men's Forum in the Methodist church, his subject being, "The Trial of Jesus Christ as Viewed by the Legal Profession."  
Mr. Eakin reviewed the biblical history and brought out views of the Christ trial that few people even though they are bible students and church goers, had been familiar with. For instance, he showed that Jesus was tried by two courts—one the Jewish court and the other the Roman court. In the Jewish court the charge against the man of Galilee was blasphemy, while in the Roman court Pontius Pilate held a desire to acquit the prisoner, but finally listened to the rabble and permitted the Jews to inflict the crucifixion even though Pilate indicated that he could see no reason for so doing.  
Analyzing the two trials from a legal standpoint Mr. Eakin showed where Jewish law had been broken repeatedly in order to convict Christ and that the act of Pilate was the worst ever known to come from a judge in the world's history.  
A good sized crowd of men had gathered to hear this well-rehearsed talk and at the close an unanimous vote of thanks was given Mr. Eakin by the assembly for its delivery.

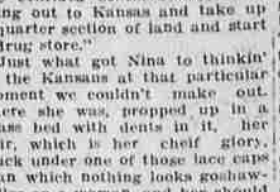

file for Seattle, there to await the next step in his fight to evade a prison sentence for submitting a false report as to the condition of the Southwestern Washington bank to the state banking department.

## OPPOSE LABOR REGIME POWER

**British Forces Making Strong Efforts to Save Baldwin Ministry; Expect Upset.**  
LONDON, (AP)— In the short period now intervening before the expected battle in the new house of commons, the most notable feature of the situation observable is the persistence of the agitation to prevent labor from forming a new government, or, failing that, make sure that such a government, once it is formed, shall have the shortest possible life.  
The latest effort in this direction has been to seize upon pending industrial disputes to afford justifiable grounds for retaining the present government in power. The argument is that in the presence of such a disturbing factor as a big railway strike a new labor administration might find its hand forced by the extremist sections of the labor party to the injury of the public interest, and that, therefore safety lies in the retention of the Baldwin administration. This argument clearly is addressed to the Liberal party, which with the Conservatives, would have the power to overthrow a labor government.  
Upset Expected This Week.  
It is impossible to say how far the argument appeals to the Liberal rank and file, but as far as Herbert S. Asquith and the other responsible Liberals are concerned it is believed there has been no change in their views on the situation and that the fall of the Baldwin ministry will come quickly perhaps next Thursday, the date at which the parliament opens.  
Without doubt big labor disputes would embrace a new labor government but thus far Ramsey MacDonald, who would be the new premier, is reported as having no intention to give representation to the extremists in his cabinet, if it is formed. He is said to be showing no timidity in this respect and there are predictions that his influence on the extremists of his party will bring about his downfall.  
The actual situation still seems to be governed by Mr. Asquith's declaration that a labor government under more favorable circumstances, may be formed by him. He is said to have meant by this that, having two strong parties in nominal opposition in the house, a labor government could not possibly risk proposing extremist measures.
