WALLOWA, Or.—The Bowman-  
Hicks Lumber company is building  
a dry kiln southwest of the saw  
mill. The foundation is well under-  
way, and fifteen men are running  
the work. The building will meas-  
ure about forty by a hundred and  
twenty feet, and will include a  
lumber decker. The kiln is to have  
a capacity of forty thousand feet,  
and will be heated by steam.  
A kiln will assist greatly in  
speeding up production as it will  
cure in a short time without the  
necessity of allowing it to dry in  
the yard. Select lumber will be

are coming into the mill at a rapid  
rate with three trains coming in  
daily.

## TABACCO PRICES BROUGHT DOWN

ATHENS, (AP)—The bumper  
tobacco crop, common to all to-  
bacco-growing states in the Near  
East, is proving a serious draw-  
back to the prosperity of this re-  
gion.

The indications are that the  
world market for the type of to-  
bacco produced in the Near East,  
formerly designated as "Turkish",  
is glutted with the product, and its  
absorbing capacity is today greatly  
limited, unless producers in Tur-  
key, Greece, Macedonia and Bul-  
garia are willing to accept much  
lower prices than they now de-  
mand.

Turkey and Bulgaria have each  
from this year's crop alone about  
50,000,000 pounds of leaf, and  
Greece has about a 150,000,000  
pounds, chiefly raised in her Macedo-  
nia possessions.

All this tobacco is for the manu-  
facture of cigarettes alone. In the  
United States, for the purpose of  
manufacture, it is blended, chiefly  
with Virginia. It might possibly  
be used for filler in the production  
of cigars, but that is still a ques-  
tion.

The impracticability of manu-  
facturing cigars out of "Turkish"  
tobacco amply proved in Bulgaria  
a few years ago, when an effort  
to build up a cigar-making indus-  
try of native tobacco proved a flat  
failure. "Turkish" tobacco does  
not possess a sufficiently large and  
tough leaf for the wrapper of a  
cigar. That is why the demand of  
America and western Europe for  
Near East tobacco is limited.

Tobacco in the Near East bears  
about the same relation to its pros-  
perity that cotton bears to the  
prosperity of the southern states of  
the United States. Tobacco is pro-  
duced even more cheaply in the  
Balkans than cotton is grown in  
the south.
