The sum of \$58,340.25 represents delinquent taxes, extending as far back as 1912, paid in during the past year. The 1923 tax is about 19 per cent delinquent.

September Casualties. Described as one of the greatest earthquakes in the history of Japan was the one that struck the island of Nippon on September 2, 1923, centering on Tokio and Yokohama. The temblor, which lasted four hours, shook down buildings and set fires which destroyed the greater part of the two cities. Hundreds of smaller cities were wiped out. The loss of life was estimated from 100,000 to 250,000. The real center of the great disturbance was around Fujiama, a
