ROAD PLANS FOR 1924 EXPLAINED
(Continued from page 1)

Clover Cr., \$16,500.00; Hunter Lane, Unit No. 2, \$16,554.48; Union-Cove, \$18,571.07; Fadd Canyon, \$2,482.55; Catherine Creek-Medical, \$879.52; Tidestad-Medical Springs, \$962.84; Indian Creek, \$43,504.29; Equipment and Repairs, \$1,958.19. Balance \$6,670.30; total, \$78,842.78; January expenditures, \$7,743.91; estimated balance for 1924, \$62,228.35.

"This balance was occasioned by weather conditions unfavorable for construction work."

"Receipts—Paid, forward from 1922, \$21,199.67; From State of Oregon, \$28,962.14; From County, \$29,120.94. Total \$78,842.78; Balance from 1923, \$6,670.30; Estimated Receipts from State, \$30,000.00; County, \$29,000.00; Estimated Balance for 1924, \$62,228.35."

County Work Approved.
Mr. Stearns asserted that it was cheaper for the county to construct their own roads instead of letting the work out on contract. "The past year's work has proven that the present court has secured cheaper and better roads by doing the work itself. The Indian Creek, Hunter Lane (Unit 2) and Fadd Canyon roads are practically the same length and about the same in view of construction. A clear comparison of costs of these roads will indicate that the latter project, constructed by the county, cost less per mile than the two former ones, built by contractors."

"The court has concluded to do its own construction insofar as there is equipment to properly handle the work. Actually, since there are no projects under consideration for construction in 1924 than there is existing machinery available, some of the work will necessarily be contracted."

New Projects.
The new projects which have been designated for construction from market road funds are listed as follows:

"Closest to Medical Springs, grading only; Bridge over Catherine Creek at city limits of Union; Eight to Jordan Creek, grading and surfacing; North Towhee to Clover Creek Section 1, surfacing; Powder River road (4.5 miles of red surfacing), and M. Glenn (section 2) grading and surfacing."

"In addition to the above considerable work will be done from the general road funds. Also the road from Island City to Cove, about which there has been considerable question, will be built from the bond fund. This road comprises the longest single project to be undertaken and will be entirely of the macadam type. When completed this road will not only connect Cove with the city but en route will serve as a trunk highway."

"Since we are on the subject of roads, it is believed that a brief excerpt from a report of the state highway engineer, Roy H. Klein, showing what is contemplated by the state for 1924 and what was accomplished in 1923 will be of interest, correlative with what Union county has accomplished."

He then presented the following excerpts:

Our "Carry-over" work consists of 5.3 miles of paving, 130.9 miles of rock and gravel surfacing, and 170.0 miles of grading. This work involves an unpaid obligation of approximately \$5,000,000.

Funds available for expenditure upon State highways during 1924 are estimated to be about as follows:

Continuing, Mr. Stearns said: "Your attention is called to the present condition of Union county's 'bond fund.' As you are aware bonds were voted as follows: For Oregon Trail, \$388,500; La Grande-Wallowa Lane, \$597,500; Hunter Lane (section 1), \$85,000; Imbler-Summitville road, \$51,000, and Island City-Cove road, \$275,000, totalling \$1,498,000. The unpaid bonds equal \$298,000, money expended to date equals \$967,210.88, and balance available is \$132,789.12."

"It is evident from the above figures that no further sale of bonds will be necessary to complete the roads originally contemplated by the bond issue."

"In conclusion let me state that the county court has felt throughout that it has had the moral support of the thoughtful men of the county and while there is no intention of depriving anyone of that greatest of indoor sports 'jumping on the county court' still we know that if we all work together we can accomplish much more than we can if our efforts are separate and opposed."

Seven years later, he was appointed to a similar position at the Catholic University in Washington D. C.

During this period, Dr. Egan was author of numerous novels, and volumes of poems and works of non-fiction. He was well known as a literature figure in the late "twenties" and in the early years of the twentieth century and held many academic degrees.

Dr. Egan went to Denmark as minister in 1907. After serving under three presidents, he was forced in 1918 to resign because of ill health, having become at that
