DIVORCE EVILS ARE ATTACKED BY PREACHER

COLUMBUS, Ohio, (INS) — "When the sanctions of religion are taken from marriage; when the law permits its indiscriminate annulment at the behest of wealth or caprice, we are hastening the process of moral decay," asserted Rev. E. E. Ross, pastor of Grandview Methodist Episcopal Church here, sermonizing on "The Divorce Condition in America."

"This condition is intensified by the fact that it is often set forth in fiction and the silent drama," continued Rev. Ross.

"Can anyone doubt the effect of such standards upon our life today? Too often marriage is a romantic impulse or romantic adventure. It also is viewed in the harsh light of a business contract to be terminated at will."

"It is surprising, under such circumstances, that the most sacred human emotions should be dragged into the courtroom and the holy bonds of matrimony be snapped asunder with an impudent and remorseless disregard of the consequences."

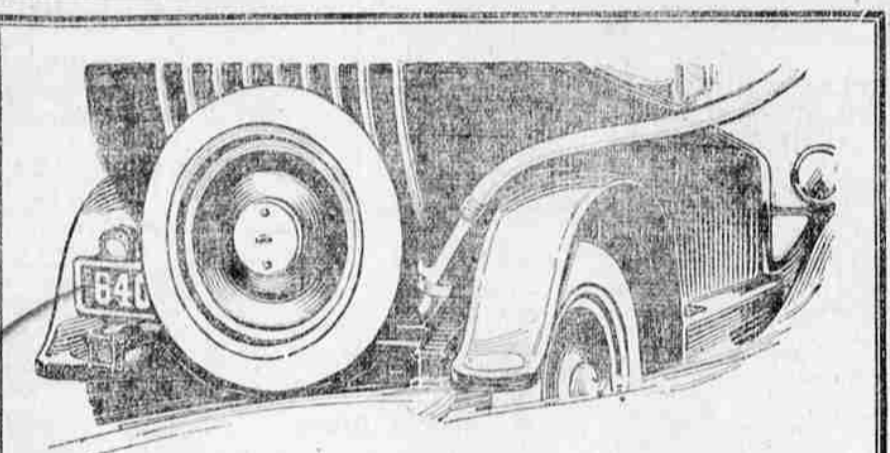
