DEMPSEY WILL FIGHT IN JUNE

Champion to Meet Tommy Gibbons in Return Bout in 15-Round Go in New York.

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—Jack Dempsey will defend his world's heavyweight title against Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul challenger, in a 15-round decision match in New York, probably at the Polo grounds, the first week in June, Tex Rickard announced Tuesday.

The promoter, who announced several days ago that he had arranged the return match between these rivals, revealed further details in denying reports that he planned to conduct the bout during the Democratic national convention which opens here June 24 in Madison Square Garden.

At the same time Rickard disclosed that after the Dempsey-Gibbons fight, contracts for which he expects to have signed within a fortnight, his next date venture

will take place before the middle of July, when he hopes to stage a heavyweight elimination contest between Harry Wells, negro contender, and Luis Angel Firpo, "wild bull of the pampas." The winner of this match, if Rickard's plans materialize, would fight Dempsey in September, providing the champion succeeded in disposing of Gibbons in June.

Rickard, who was a member of the citizens' committee that worked to bring the Democratic convention here, declared he wanted to make it plain that there will be no holds held here under his auspices during the political convulsion or any effort on his part to commercialize the event.

In this connection, the promoter pointed out that the \$55,000 guaranteed the convention for congressmen at Madison Square Garden was fixed merely as a maximum return from this source. Any and all profit over that amount will go to the convention, he asserted.
