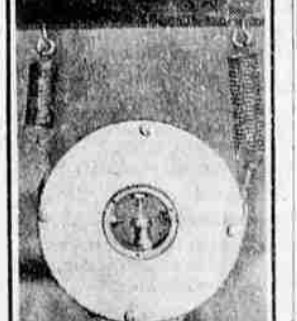

Record Number of British Spent Holidays on Continent
LONDON, (AP)—The number of Englishmen deserting their country for the sunshine and gaiety of the continent over the Christmas season broke all records this year. For two weeks before Christmas the trains leaving the English metropolis for the continent were filled to capacity and as a Christmas dress near they were run in as many as six sections.

Foreigners were unusually scarce in London for the Yuletide, and places where they are accustomed to frequent were almost deserted. This applied principally to Americans.
