OLYMPIC GAME SKED ALTERED

French Committee Revises Schedule for Coming Olympic Games in Paris.

PARIS, (AP)—Competitions in the English Olympic Games in Paris next year will occupy the greater part of May, June and July, according to the revised schedule just published by the French Olympic committee.

Beginning in May with the Rugby and Association football trials, the culminating point of the Olympics will come with the great athletic week July 5 to 12.

After the conclusion of the winter sports at Chamonix, Feb. 6, the most Olympic competition will come with Rugby football, from May 2 to May 19 and will cover football from May 15 to June 9. These matches will take place in the new stadium built for the semi-finals, the stadium trials having been held at Versailles stadium, the Velodrome, Parc des Princes, the Buffalo and Remoy-Stadiums.

Then will come the ceremonial opening of the games, which will be preceded by a festival commemorating the thirtieth anniversary of the resumption of the Olympic Games. This festival will be celebrated June 22. Two ceremonies, one in the Notre Dame cathedral in the morning and the other in the evening at the Sorbonne, will be the main features of the day. The following day a gala performance will be given at the Opera.

The delegates from the Federations of Sports and Athletics, represented at the games, after having been officially received by President Millerand at the Elysee on July 2, will be the guests of the French Olympic committee at a banquet.

Finally, at two o'clock in the afternoon of July 5, the solemn ceremony of the official opening of the games will take place at the "Stade de France" stadium.

From that day until July 27, the various Olympic events will be conducted, while numerous championships of Sporting Federations will be held.

The revised schedule of games follows:

Athletics, Colombes Stadium, July 5 to 12.

Penathlon, Colombes Stadium, July 12 to 15.

Law-Tennis, Colombes Stadium, July 12 to 20.

Rowing, Colombes Stadium, July 21 to 27.

Swimming, Colombes Stadium, July 21 to 27.

Canoeing, Colombes Stadium, July 21 to 27.

Water polo, Colombes Stadium, July 21 to 27.

Handball, Colombes Stadium, July 21 to 27.

Baseball, Colombes Stadium, July 21 to 27.

Softball, Colombes Stadium, July 21 to 27.

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For the Dal-de-Poulgus and Saint Cloud from June 25 to July 20.

The dates are: Greco-Roman wrestling, July 5 to July 7. Catch-as-catch-can, July 10 to 12. Boxing, July 15 to 20. Weight, July 21 to 24. Fencing, July 26 to 27.

UNION CAGERS DEFEAT ELGIN

Maroon and White Basketball Team Triumphant in Contest—Score 40 to 11.

UNION, (Special)—Union high school basketball team defeated the Elgin high school team here Friday evening 40 to 11.

Last Friday evening Union again expected to have two games in the gym, Elgin having planned to bring their girl indoor basketball team, when the high school boys came for basketball, but Coach Paterben who arrived with the hoops early in the evening, announced that all basketball games had been postponed by the Elgin high school girls (all the basketball season was over, Union started the game with Blacker and McCallan forwards, Jensen center, and Caldwell and Gilmore as guards. Before thirty seconds had lapsed Union had two field baskets chalked up. Jensen and McCallan having connected. The first quarter ended Union 11, Elgin 2, and about the same ratio lead was kept by the local team during the entire game. The visitors put up a game fight but were outclassed. The final score was 40 to 11. Gilmore's one basket was from the center of the floor and McCallan threw two into from the center of the floor. Jensen and McCallan each had seven field baskets but Jensen added two fouls to his score while McCallan secured only one. Jensen standing high point man with a score of 15. Blacker, playing forward, made three field baskets, and shot one foul. The game was a little slow, the Union boys still showing some stiffness as a result of the three games in Watlous county last week.

Although the first agreement was for Union to play the La Grande high school second team of girls, the latter preferred to play the first team in the game here Saturday evening and as a result the local sextette was badly defeated.

La Grande's girls were older, larger and more experienced and easily won the game although Union scored first Doris Hunter securing a field basket before a half minute of play. That was Union's last connection with the hoop until the last quarter when three more baskets were secured. La Grande scored repeatedly throughout the game which ended with the score 28 to 8. Mrs. Kelley, Union coach, refereed the first two quarters and Miss Marchison, La Grande coach the second half.

After the girls' game North Powder and Union's second team took the floor. This was another one-sided contest although not quite so much as the first game. Powder easily won by means of quicker passing and more accurate basket shooting. Union's scores came mostly in the second and third quarters, Hansen securing one basket in the second, and both he and Geertsen one in the third. A foul in the last quarter by Geertsen brought Union's total up to 7, while Powder scored in all four quarters, ending with 17 points. One Powder man was disqualified for personal fouls and several were called on other players in both teams. Geertsen refereed. Elliot, coach of the Powder team, came down with the boys on the trip.

WANTS FOOTBALL CODE UNCHANGED

NEW YORK, (AP)—A suggestion that college authorities can and should correct dangers that threaten college football is contained in the 1923 report of E. K. Hall, of Dartmouth, chairman of the Football Rules Committee to the National Collegiate A. A.

"If there are any dangers threatening the prestige or good name of the game," he declared, "they are not, in our opinion, of such nature that they can be averted by a mere framing of rules."

Mr. Hall urged the N. C. A. A. to work through the academic and athletic officials of the college in upholding the football code, stating that the apparently unlimited increase in general interest and support necessitated vigilance in preserving the good name and integrity of the sport.

"The responsibility," he continued, "rests on the friends of this greatest of academic sports to make certain, not only that the game while being played, is kept free from unfair and unsportsmanlike tactics, but that the preparations for the football season and the development of the teams are equally free from anything which savors of unfair competition and unsportsmanlike tactics."

"The game itself is played in the open and under the supervision of officials who will not tolerate unfair tactics. If the preparations for the season and the building up of teams are likewise made in the open and under supervision of officials who will not tolerate unfair tactics, the game will be a fair one and its prestige and good name will be preserved."

Academic officials who will neither tolerate unsportsmanlike practices or standards in their own institutions by approving schedules on which appear teams whose first concern is having a strong team and whose last concern is how they get it, the efforts of the rules committee to make the game a good one will be powerfully supplemented.

The rules committee has put itself on record as opposed now to making any fundamental changes in the regulating the gridiron game.

Dayton Driver Winner.

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Fred Leichter of Dayton, Ohio, won the feature 25-mile event of a dirt track automobile race program which marked the opening of the new Anco speedway here Sunday, covering 18 laps of the scheduled 40 in the five-eighths-mile oval in 11 minutes and 34 seconds. Fred Horey of St. Paul, American dirt track champion, finished second, and Arthur Davidson of Indianapolis came in third. The race was stopped after the eighteenth lap on account of dust.

Fred Luchling of San Luis Obispo, Cal., was fourth; Harry Hooker of Los Angeles, fifth, and Ralph de Palma, internationally famous board and dirt track driver, sixth.

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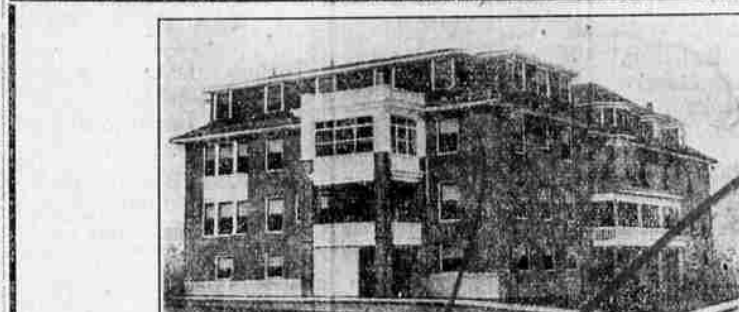
