GIRL HONORED BY PRESIDENT

Mother of "Princess Columbia" Is at Hot Lake — Daughter Posed with President Harding.

HOT LAKE, Special. — Mother of "Princess Columbia," chosen to represent the Inland Empire in the Columbia Irrigation Project, and herself prominent in Maudslayi and social circles in Mrs. William Thompson, mother of the Hot Lake skater, Mrs. Thompson's home is Lewiston, Idaho, where her husband is president of the Lewiston bank and the Idaho Trust company. Her daughter, Miss Elizabeth, who was proclaimed "Princess Columbia" over more than three hundred contestants for this honor, is taking an active part in the effort to render favorable the Upper Columbia basin.

When the late President and Mrs. Warren G. Harding visited Spokane to view the proposed undertaking, Mrs. Thompson was one of the committee of five to formally welcome the nation's executive to the city. Other events of that day for "Princess Columbia" included her posing for a picture with the President, at his request, and her being the sole speaker at a banquet tendered in his honor that evening.

Mrs. Thompson has drawn over here from Himmerville the first of the week. She came for the combined purposes of consultation and visiting her mother, Mrs. Mary McCoy, a hospital patient from near Albion.

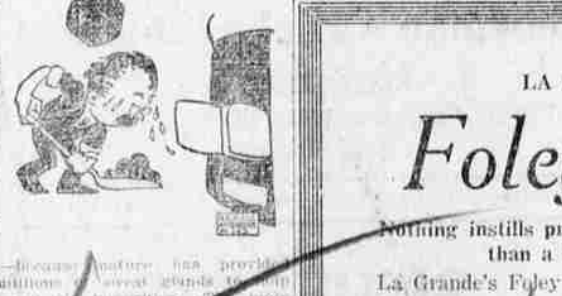

ALUTIAN ISLAND BECOMES IMPORTANT SHEEP RANGE

SEATTLE, Wl. (AP)—A herd of 2,000 sheep landed in the fall at Unimak Island, one of the larger of the Aleutian Islands at the northern end of the Pacific Ocean, will be increased by additional shipments to 20,000 next year, according to Aman Moore of this city. Mr. Moore is one of the promoters of a project to make the island a sheep range rivaling the industry that has distinguished Falkland Islands off the coast of South America.

"There is a wonderful stand of grass on Unimak, knee-high, and not a tree or bush on the island," said Mr. Moore.

The government has given a lease on 250,000 acres on the island for the enterprise and has promised 150,000 acres more when needed. A. L. Mackintosh, a pioneer sheepherder of Oregon, is credited with discovering that the island was a potential sheep range.

LIMA, PERU, IS DIMMED BY FAME OF LIMA, OHIO

LIMA, O. (L.N.S.) — Although Lima, Ohio, was named for Lima, Peru, it has passed its namesake, from the viewpoint of world renown—at least in the estimation of foreign and domestic postal authorities.

Mail assigned to the Italian Legation at Lima, Peru, was delivered to the Republic-Gazette, a morning newspaper, here by post-office authorities. It bore the inscription "R. Legatione d'Italia, LIMA," the Italian authorities thinking it unnecessary to add "Peru."

Across the top was the inscription "Gazette d'Italia del Regno d'Italia," indicating the contents. The puzzled mail clerks here decided to deliver it to the nearest "Gazette"—and that newspaper got it.

It resumed its long journey to Peru a few days ago.
