NAME HUNTER AS DIRECTOR

Wheat Growers Perfect Organization in Pendleton; La Grande Man Is Chosen on Directorate.

PENDLETON, Or. — Wheat growers, bankers and business men representing five counties of eastern Oregon in their state meeting held here in the Elks building perfected a temporary Oregon Export Commission League, elected temporary officers and adopted resolutions endorsing the McNary Haugen bill that is now before congress.

The meeting was attended by men to the number of 395, who registered and dozens came in later and took up all available space in the big lodge room. Estimates of the total crowd ranged between 475 and 500 men.

Speakers Got Attention. It was a serious minded crowd that came early and stayed thru about four hours of speech making and motion pictures. The speakers on the program received the close attention of the farmers who have been waiting for several years for an "adjustment" that will enable them to realize a profit on their farming operations.

S. H. Thompson of Pendleton, was chosen temporary president of the league, and R. W. Ritter was elected to the office of secretary-treasurer at the meeting of the temporary board of directors that was held after the main meeting had adjourned. Vice-presidents included W. S. Powell of Moro and left Jones of Heppner. Directors of the temporary organization in addition to the officers include: R. B. Ingles of Dufur, A. E. Hunter of La Grande, C. B. Cox of Heppner, H. B. Davidson of Joseph and W. L. Thompson of Portland.

N. Y.'s "Civic Center" Many an equine aristocrat has bowed his crest and tossed his head, proud of his blue ribbon, and in the annual horse shows held here while dogs with lengthy pedigrees have held forth in their canine glory in many a dog show.

Unnumbered prize fights, six-day bike races and every other conceivable kind of sport exhibition which can be held in a great arena have been presented in the Garden.

The voices of the nation's great orators—David B. Hill, Henry George, Tom Johnson, William Jennings Bryan, Bourke Cockran, Augustus Thomsen, the silver-tongued Grady, Theodore Roosevelt and Samuel Gompers—have resounded through its corridors, heard by great throngs.

Madison Square Garden came into being more through a process of evolution than as a creation.

The site on which the present building is located was recognized as a center of sports activities and the public assemblies shortly after the war for independence.

Long before any of the ramshackle build-ups which immediately preceded construction of the Garden, were built the entire neighborhood of what is now Madison Square and before that the intersection of Broadway and Twenty-third street, was dedicated to cock-fights, dog fights and athletic contests of various sorts.

More than seven score years ago the city reserved four acres in this district, known as the Chamber Street estate, at Elizabeth street and the Old Boston Post road, as a sort of public playground for men, women and children.

It is in Tradition. Hence the wealth of tradition that surrounds the Garden and the deep and tender affection for it and for the hallowed landmarks which surround it, found of which have long since given way to the march of progress and the steadily increasing value of realty.

The immediate legitimate predecessor of Madison Square Garden was Francisco's Hippodrome which had also served certainly the same purpose as the Garden has for a number of years. The Hippodrome was succeeded by the Eliza Avenue Hotel and for some time after this New York was without any suitable place for large public gatherings, except for the Crystal Palace, which burned within a comparatively new structure.

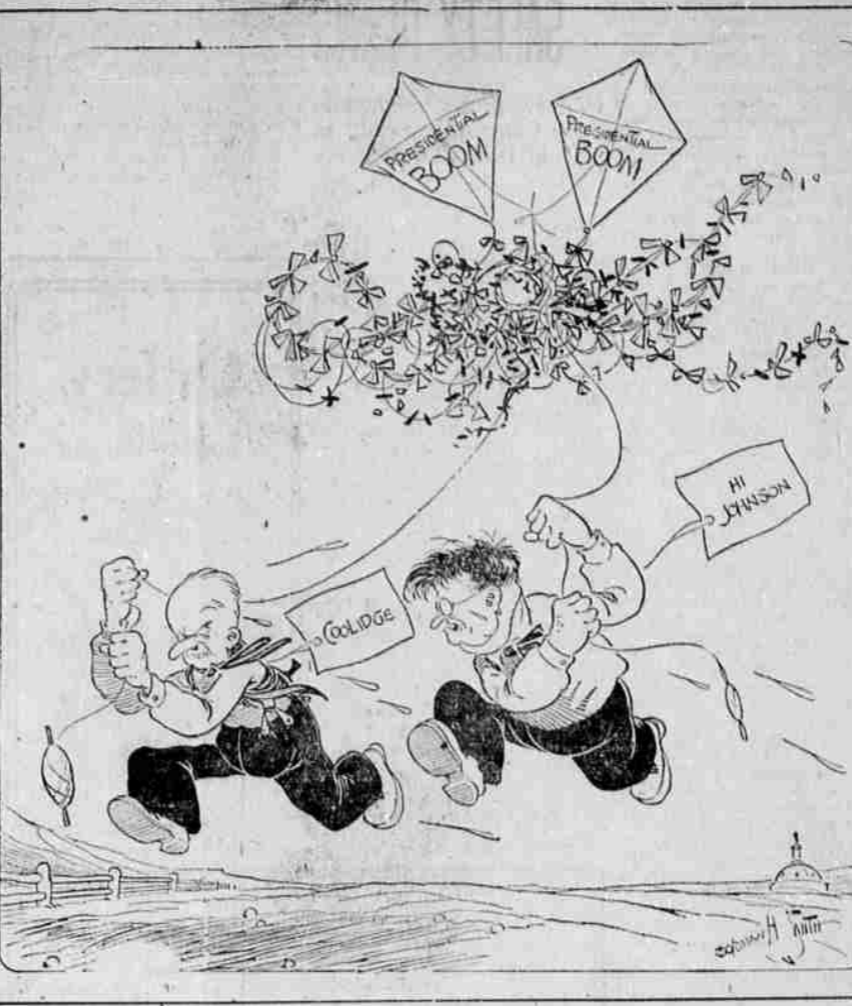
At one time, in the interval, the section was occupied by the Harlem Railroad passenger station, from which radiated horsecars, connecting with the steam lines. Above of the commercial Grand Central Terminal, which was built by J. T. Larran, whose name is synonymous with the circus, was in the location an ideal spot to present "the greatest show on earth," and did so. The traditional "high top" was made largely of jettied and supported by a steel frame which was put up in 1870. It was followed by J. G. Gilmore, who built brick walls around the arena and created a somewhat better roof over it than Barron had used. In April 1871, this place was opened as Gilmore's Garden, and in 1873 the name was changed to Madison Square Garden. The present structure, a triumph of architectural art, was opened in 1892.

Garden Saved. The Garden, with a few minor changes, will cost approximately \$1,000,000.

In 1911 there was recurring talk of tearing down the historic structure and substituting it with one which would produce a larger and more certain revenue than the present building. The building, however, had been a paying investment. The hue and cry raised by the newspapers and the public effectually disposed of this plan, but not until after a public auction had been held for its sale, and much talk of its purchase by the city.

Tom Richard, banker, now operates the Garden.

funds for the year in progress. These latter requests, commonly known as supplemental estimates, may be justified occasionally to meet real emergencies or contingencies arising after the budget has been sent to congress, or to meet obligations authorized by law. It is only in cases such as these that the chief executive will favorably consider the transmission to congress of supplemental estimates.

"We are all the servants of the people of this nation. When congress representing the people, has appropriated funds with which to carry on the business of government, we must confine our operations within the limit of these funds. We have neither the authority nor the right to incur obligations beyond such limits. On the other hand, our plain duty is to make every possible effort to effect some savings from these funds.

"I take this occasion to state that I have given much thought to the question of federal subsidies to state government. The federal appropriation for such subsidies cover a wide field. These afford ample precedent for unlimited expansion. I say to you, however, that the financial program of the chief executive does not contemplate expansion of these subsidies. My policy in this matter is not predicated alone on the drain which these subsidies make on the national treasury. This of itself is sufficient cause for concern. But I am fearful that this broadening of the field of government activities is detrimental both to the federal government and the state governments. Efficiency of federal operations is impaired as their scope is unduly enlarged. Efficiency of the state governments is impaired as they relinquish and turn over to the federal government responsibilities which are rightfully theirs."

"There can be no deviations from the economy program, Mr. Coolidge asserted, and he called upon all spending agencies of the government to increase their efficiency and curb the outgo at every turn.

"The budget has been a success," Mr. Coolidge continued. "You have demonstrated there can be a business organization of the government. With the easing of conditions, the time is at hand when we shall decide whether a business administration is to continue or whether our government is to lapse into the old businesslike and wasteful extravagance. As for me, I am for economy. There is scarcely an economic ill anywhere in our country that cannot be traced directly or indirectly to high taxes. To increase that burden is to disregard the general welfare. Through constructive economy, to decrease taxes is to enlarge the reward of every one who toils. Expenditures Must Be Kept Down

"I say to you frankly that except where specifically authorized by law, I will not countenance the incurring of obligations in excess of these appropriations. I am equally frank in saying to you that I do not look with favor upon the practice of asking for additional
