BERLIN (AP)—The military dictator of Berlin recently announced his intention of compelling the proprietors of cafeterias, night restaurants and dance halls to do their share toward relieving distress among the poor of the city.

Huge Cheese Goes to London.
MELBOURNE, Australia. (AP)—Australia has sent to the British Empire Exhibition a mammoth cheese weighing one and a half tons. A photograph taken at Pittsburg where the cheese was manufactured shows sixty school children seated on it. Experts report that in spite of its enormous size, every morning 20 needy school children, and a number of others are about to adopt similar measures.

Five thousand children in the public schools are now being provided with a plate of soup each morning through funds raised by teachers and patrons of schools.

Corn Plentiful on Minneapolis Market

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—For years recognized as a prime wheat trading center, Minneapolis lately has risen perceptibly as a cash corn market, second only to Chicago.

To support this contention, figures show that since the new crop began to move Minneapolis receipts of corn have been surpassed only by Chicago, the leading corn marketing place, with some days little disparity in arrivals at either city being noted.

Grain dealers here are of the opinion that the increased corn acreage in the Northwest, especially in Minnesota, and yields which have demonstrated that corn will thrive in this section, have been contributing factors in the development of Minneapolis as a corn market. Favorable weather for curing, husking and marketing, it was added, also helped the north-west market.

Receipts of corn since the crop movement started this year are more than double those of the corresponding period a year ago. Figures disclose, further emphasizing the progress of corn as a leading grain here.

Eastern houses, an account of the excellent quality of the corn arriving here, have come to Minneapolis for filling their export orders even after the close of navigation, because of the "low moisture" and excellent quality corn available here.

German Distillers Threaten To Resume Grain Bootlegging

HAMBURG (AP)—Because of annoying government restrictions German whiskey manufacturers have threatened to admit bootlegging licentia to carry on the importation of wine and corn to keep their stills from idling.

Holding that grain under present conditions is more essential in Germany as a food than as a basis for strong liquors, the minister of finance has refused to grant the distillers the necessary permits to deal in foreign currencies which they must have to purchase abroad the cereals used in making whiskey. The distillers have let it be known that if necessary bootlegger grains will be brought from other countries to supply the much required raw material plants so that their trade may not suffer.
