RED SOX NOW ON THE MEND

Boston Manager Makes a Number of Good Trades; Chances Are Improved.

NEW YORK.—Having been dismantled, dispirited, disgraced and laid waste by the maverick deal of a former owner, the Boston Red Sox are being built anew on the ruins of their former greatness by a new and progressive regime. At the start of the 1922 season the Sox were considered hopeless and proceeded to prove it by finishing last.

They had been reduced from the status of world's champions to a jobber outfit in the comparatively brief interval of five years by Harry Frazee's transactions with the New York Yankees. Such men as Ruth, Knabe, Pennock, Jones, Ruth, Hoyt, Scott, Pagan, Schling, Smith and others were traded or sold to the Yankees, who give little except money in return.

In brief, Frazee sold the world's championship from Boston to New York. Finally, having sold everything that was not nailed down, he sold the franchise to a syndicate, headed by Bobby Quinn, then business manager of the St. Louis Browns.

Quinn's policy of reconstruction already is showing results and not a few baseball men are of the opinion that the Sox will climb as high as the head of the second division this season. Among other things, Quinn recently engineered a trade with Cleveland that was a master stroke.

He gave up George Burns, a hard hitting first baseman, and "Chick" Fowler and Al Walters, a second-class infielder and catcher, for catcher Steve O'Neill, infielder Bill Wambogans, outfielder Connolly and Pitcher Howe.

BABE RUTH IS WORTH MILLION
