CHICAGO.—Chicago's Civic Opera company will blaze a trail of harmony for 19,000 miles at the close of the opera season in Chicago January 26 and in a period of eight weeks will present grand opera in 17 cities. The itinerary includes cities from Boston in the east to Houston in the south, to San Francisco on the Pacific coast.

Two special trains will be required to carry the approximately 225 people and the equipment necessary for the presentations. C. A. Rhoads, manager of the tour, has completed arrangements for the appearances of the company in Boston, the first city on the itinerary, beginning January 28 and ending February 9.

Other cities on the itinerary include Pittsburgh, Detroit, Cincinnati, Chattanooga, Tulsa, Houston, Dallas, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland, Seattle, Salt Lake City, Denver, Wichita. The tour will wind up at Kansas City, Mo., March 22.

Conductor "Chalapa" will have the title role in "Don Giovanni" and will appear with Edith Mason, in "Macbeth." Miss Irma Hausman will be the baroness of "The Jewess"—a role in which she has never been excelled according to critics. Mary Gordon, will be Cleopatra.

Miss Gracilia Murdo, dramatic soprano, will appear in Boston and Cleveland and, instead of continuing with the company, will go to Havana, Cuba, to fill an engagement and later to Mexico City. It is understood she is planning to return to Chicago next autumn.

COOKS ADVISE PARIS WOMEN

Tell Them Reasons Why They Cannot Become Chefs—Fatigue Held One Cause.

PARIS.—"Why are women never the big chefs in the kitchen?" This is the subject of an interesting questionnaire recently published in "Les Femmes" by Charles d'Arville. The author is convinced that the women, after having demanded the right to enter a number of professions formerly reserved for the men, have not profited by the shortage of domestics to become the chief "hash singers" in many a French or foreign palace.

The answer is a simple one, according to Marie Verone, president of the French League for Woman Suffrage. In this trade, as in many others, one must earn his grade step by step and rise from scullion to chef by slow promotions. That is, he must become an apprentice, and this indispensable apprenticeship is forbidden to women, not by any law, but what is worse, by the workers themselves.

"It seems to me," continues Madame Verone, "that this is certain-

ly our domain—the kitchen. What possible objection can one make when a woman steps into the kitchen?"

There is too great fatigue, answer all the great chefs consulted upon this subject. Besides, a woman lacks the knowledge of one thousand and one little things she must know as well as the necessary authority to command and direct a whole regiment of Fettes and sous-chefs. And then, too, adds Prosper Montaigne, there is the misfortune of having her hair curl buried by the continual fire of the great stove and reddened by wines which are constantly necessary to taste.

There are only concerted exco-

munions, thinks the president of the Suffrage League, who declares that what is really done is to leave to the woman all the lower vocations, which are very poorly paid in France. There are many modest establishments where the cooking is done by women, but they are forbidden to enter the great restaurants where their capacities, recognized and appreciated, might permit them to obtain a little success.

As for fatigue, the market women carrying great baskets and sacks of vegetables, the street sweepers and the newspaper sellers, mostly women, all lead a life that is infinitely more fatiguing.
