NEW YORK HAS CHANGED SOME MAY REMODEL BUILDING SOON

Reminiscent Memories of Past Democratic Conventions Are Made Public.

NEW YORK, (U.S.S.)—Well do I remember. We had 200 guests... It was the shade of Charlie Adams, clerk at the Astor House, talking. The Astor House stood on the corner of Broadway and Vesey street then—fifty-six years ago, when New York held its first and only national political convention. "We're expecting 200,000 out-of-town visitors in for the big gathering this year," Mark A. Caldwell, head of the New York Hotel Men's association, replied. "Must have been at least 5,000 strangers in town for the meeting in 1867," the shade of Adams recalled.

With the folk from Jersey and the New England states, New York expects to entertain an extra million during the 1924 convention, Caldwell informed. It is a different New York the city of 1867—when Horatio Seymour was nominated—which will greet the 1924 Democratic delegates.

PHYMERE COWS SET RECORDS

HOT LAKE, (Special)—High records of production have again won recognition for Dr. W. T. Pym's herd of Holstein-Friesians. Two of the Phymere farm cows are listed in a report of "twenty leading cows and heifers by class" issued annually by the central office of the association of breeders of Holsteins. This report covers the best records of animals on ten months' test and includes reports issued monthly.

The two cows of the Phymere herd to be included in the roll of honor are Hazelwood Josephine Korndyke, junior three year old and Polka Postum Longfield, entered in the junior two year old class. Hazelwood Josephine Korndyke made it possible in 305 days for 17,324.9 pounds of milk to be served on the Hot Lake sanatorium tables. Of this amount 754.37 pounds was butter. The younger cow gave in ten months 16,515.8 pounds of milk, with 748.62 pounds of butter. Her record has continued high and shows at the end of 343 days, 21,734.4 pounds of milk with 938.7 of this amount butter.

Bathroom Ceiling Drilled.
CHICAGO (AP)—Reports that Rev. John Obavsky, pastor of St. John the Baptist, Roman Catholic church, in South Chicago, had been fired upon today in the rectory and had been wounded were unfounded, the police learned today. The presence of a revolver with one empty chamber in the bathroom and a bullet hole in the ceiling and the declaration of John Navik that his sister, Irene, the niece of Obavsky, heard a shot are yet unexplained.

Unique Chiefs Organize.
ROSEMBURG, Or.—The Unique Chiefs have perfected their organization and are now awaiting uniform, which are expected any time. The organization is composed of 43 men, all active members of the chamber of commerce. If a member misses a specific number of meetings, he is dropped from the rolls. Committees have been appointed to take charge of different activities, and help will be given in all of the industrial and civic life.
