## U. S. CITIZEN BECOMES JAP

### American So Impressed With Nipponese That He Will Live Among Them.

TOKYO, (INS)—Japanese steels and human resources are exhibited during the earthquake period have so impressed Professor Daniel Langford, Tokyo American and one-time member of the staff of the Japanese Advertiser, that he has determined to give up his American citizenship and become a subject of the Emperor of Japan. Langford's decision to give up his American citizenship was followed by a cable to his wife and child in California, asking them to come once to Japan for a permanent residence here as Japanese.

Langford is 42 years old and has been a resident of Honolulu and Japan for the last ten years. Four years ago, while Yokohama representative of the Japan Advertiser, Langford became interested in the study of shells, and in his work of improving his collection he traveled to the various seashores of Japan, always making his trips with Japanese friends. Thus he became acquainted with various professors in the Japanese universities, and he learned the way of living of the country. He served in various newspaper positions prior to the earthquake and then accepted a position as Professor of English at the Keio University of Tokyo.

Admires Them.  
 Langford says what he saw of the Japanese people during the earthquake period caused him to apply for citizenship here. Not only in one section of the country but everywhere he traveled, says Langford, did he see exhibited a kind spirit toward foreigners, a stoicism which was most remarkable and an attitude of courage in the midst of the greatest disaster of modern times. On the day of the quake Langford, accompanied by Mr. K. Ishibashi, of the Sanitary Department of the Metropolitan Police Bureau, was at Manazuru, on the seashore, collecting shells. The two men were in bathing suits, searching for shells, when the quake came. They saw a cliff slide down and bury their clothes and then saw the tide go out in such a manner as to indicate a tidal wave was coming. Giving up hope of getting their clothes, the two men fled toward the mountains and started a long walk to Yokohama, wearing only scanty bathing suits. On the road the Japanese village people, themselves afraid to sleep in their houses because of the expectation of another earthquake, gave Langford and his Japanese friend rice cakes and water to drink. One man gave Langford his shirt, when he saw that the American was shivering with cold. Others seeing his feet were being cut by the stones, offered him straw sandals.

Aided Relief  
 When Langford reached Tokyo he immediately applied to the American Embassy, where he joined many other Americans in working to aid the refugees of Tokyo. For over a week he worked in the warehouse of the Embassy, issuing food to Americans and others from the supplies sent in by the ships of Admiral Anderson. All the time he was working to aid his own countrymen Langford was contemplating the possibility of abandoning his American citizenship and becoming a Japanese. Shortly after the relief work for Americans was finished Langford announced his intention of applying for citizenship here.

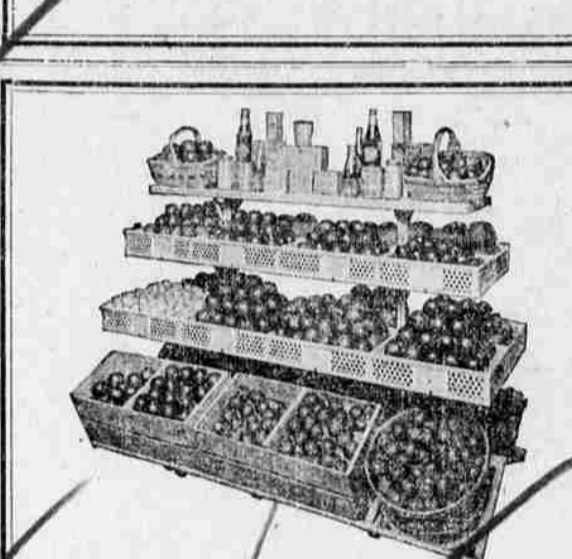
