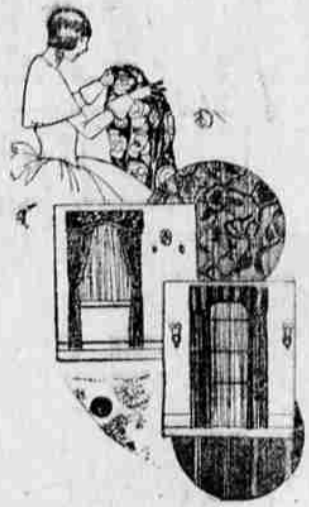

EUGENE GETS TRACK MEET

Pacific Coast Conference Track and Field Stars to Gather There Next May.

EUGENE, Or. (Special)—The Pacific coast conference track and field meet is to be held at the University of Oregon next year. At the recent conference of managers held in Berkeley, a vote was cast to hold the meet May 20 and 21, and since this will be the only opportunity for east athletes to compete for positions on America's Olympic team before the national tryouts, starting June 15, at Boston, the conference authorities voted to extend invitations to all institutions of the coast.

In departing from their usual conservative plan, Jack Brasher, Graduate Manager at the University, said that the conference managers were not only influenced by the fact that there was a need for team elimination tryouts for the Olympic team, but also by the fact that there was a rising tide of track enthusiasm on the coast which demanded something. Invitations will be sent to all colleges and universities on the coast so far east as Nevada and Montana.

It will not be necessary that any school enter a full team in the meet. Any small college possessing one or two men of top notch caliber may enter the contest providing that the men are willing to compete under east conference eligibility rules; and providing that their expenses at the meet will be defrayed by their own institution.

At the Berkeley meeting two changes were made in the technicalities of running track meets. The number of entries from each school was increased from 12 to 14 men and the number of men permitted to enter one track event was limited to three. NEW YORK (AP)—Shelby, the little Montana boom town, where the Dempsey-Gibbons championship fight last July 4 left a trail of financial disaster, has risen again from obscurity to offer five hundred thousand dollars for the 1924 version of the Dempsey-Gibbons fight.

Tex Rickard, who plans to stage the return title fight here during the first week in June, announced Friday he had received such an offer on behalf of the Shelby chamber of commerce for a fight there next July 4. The promoter hastened to act, however, that he did not close hastily the offer which is two hundred thousand dollars in excess of the guarantee which the Montana men failed to meet after a financial struggle that resulted in intensely the ring battle it involved.

FOREST GAME CENSUS GIVEN

Oregon and Washington Rangers Prepare Figures Available at Portland Office.

Game census figures prepared by forest rangers in Oregon and Washington have just been compiled by the Portland office of the Forest Service.

The figures relate only to the 27 million acres of national forest lands within these two states.
