On organized in each next summer, according to a statement issued from the offices of Major General Henry T. Allen, executive officer of the American Olympic Committee, thirteen cities and towns scattered all the way from here to the Pacific Coast are represented on the list.

The New York City quota of \$100,000 heads the column. Philadelphia comes next with a quota of \$50,000, and Boston third, with one of \$25,000. Cleveland, O., is asked to raise \$25,000 and Detroit \$15,000. Buffalo, Newark and Washington, D. C., are down for \$15,000 each and Trenton, N. J., Worcester, Mass., and Youngstown, O., for \$10,000 each. Several cities and towns have consented, through their local Olympic committees, to be enrolled in the \$5,000 class, among them being El Paso, Texas; Harrisburg, Pa., and Kingstown, N. Y.

"These quotas have all been accepted by the committee appointed to examine the respective cities and towns for subscription toward the fund," General Allen explained. "While none of the amounts are binding, we have every hope of seeing each of them filled—even over-subscribed. Our purpose is a worthy one—the promotion of American athletic supremacy at the request of all international sports events. The city citizens are all capable, earnest workers, who have unselfishly agreed to the undertaking. They deserve prompt and ample response."

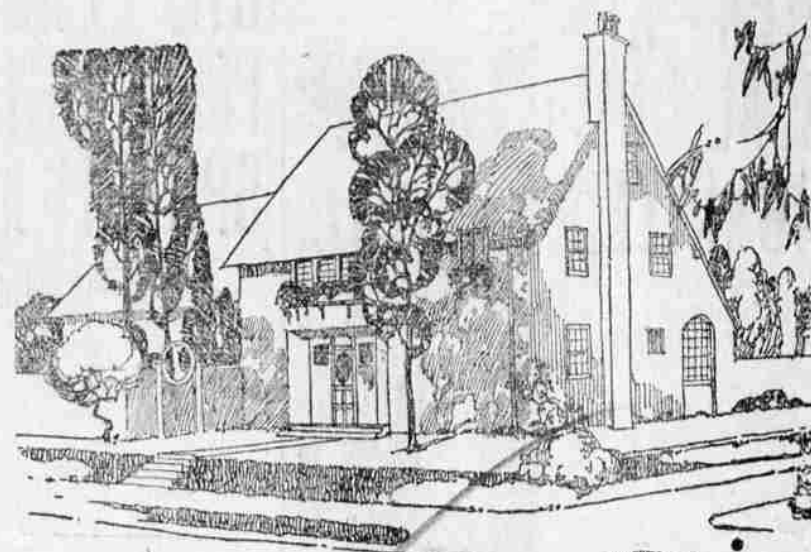

### PHILLIES NOT TO REST IN CELLAR THIS YEAR, CLAIM

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—The Phillies of National League cellar infamy, are going to be a better baseball club this coming season, or they may be one suicide and about twenty-two numbers committed, President William Horner is the "complacent optimist" who already has spoken in terms of "bully work or bullies."  
"Philadelphia is going to see a much-improved National League team next season," William said before starting out on a three-week junket to points south. "If we don't do better than last season I will feel like shooting myself and each individual on my team. But frankly both Fletcher and myself expect a much better showing during the coming season."  
"The team is bound to improve," he said. "We have strengthened it considerably since last season, with a good second baseman and a hard-hitting outfielder. I would like to get another pitcher or two as steady as Jimmy Ring. If I do this will be no stopping us."  
Pitchers, therefore, will likely be the objective of Baker and Manager Art Fletcher at the National League meeting on February 22 in the Waldorf-Astoria, New York. But he made emphatic declaration that his battery line-up—Jimmy Ring and "Hutch" Henline—will not figure in any deal. Any trades contemplated will be done with these two excluded from the deal. There were reports that Baker was to trade them to the Pittsburgh Pirates and lot of pitchers.  
"The Phillies' president added by the way, that the National League meeting will see an extraordinary lot of trading. Nearly every team in the league, he said, is anxious to talk trade.  
It might be fitting to add, also, that Baker thinks his manager, Art Fletcher, is one of the best managers in baseball.  
The Ford influence is considerable, but he won't be the only fixer in the campaign.

### Finns Win in Olympic Speed Skating Events at Chamoix, Ending Sunday.

CHAMOIX (AP)—Finland with only three men entered, won first honors in the speed skating events of the 1924 winter Olympic games which were concluded Sunday with a total of 452 points. Norway was second with 252 points and America third with 11 points. Sweden got one point.  
America failed to add a single point to its earlier position in Sunday's events—the 1,500-meter and 10,000-meter races.  
Thunberg of Finland won the 1,500-meter race, his time being 2 minutes and 20 4-5 seconds. Skutnabb, also of Finland, was the victor in the 10,000-meter race, going the distance in 78 minutes and 44 5-8 seconds.
