CREDIT BANKS MAKE REPORTS

Increased Loans and Assets Over September Are Made Public.

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—Increased loans and assets over the month made public last September are reported by the Federal Reserve bank of Spokane in a statement made public by W. M. Ruckelshaus, manager.

Total assets now amount to \$7,048,282, an increase of \$1,294,745 since the September figures, the statement says.

More than a half million dollar gain in direct loans is noted, the amount climbing from \$150,000 about four months ago to \$719,164 at the present time.

Redeemable securities increased \$24,124 with the total placed at \$1,004,272 as against figures of \$350,151 announced in the 1923 report.

Government securities took a decided jump with new figures set at \$2,080,500 as compared with \$250,000 announced last year.

The amount in deposit with banks decreased from \$31,717 to \$23,823 and accrued interest on securities rose from \$2102 to \$2116.

The \$2,080,500 capital stock remains the same as in September.

Insurance Gain Is Big. SALEM, Or.—Insurance written by all companies operating in Oregon has increased from \$24,110,618.40 in 1922 to \$1,007,184,929.17 in 1923 according to a report prepared here by Will H. Moore, state insurance commissioner.

In 1912 the insurance written in the state aggregated \$297,481,256.60. Gross premiums collected during 1922 were \$24,808,884.64, an amount of \$16,004,209.55 in 1912 and \$2,569,777.74 in 1902.

Losses paid in 1922 totaled \$14,497,784.25. In 1912 losses paid aggregated \$5,230,824.60 and in 1902 the amount was \$1,200,715.74.

Although the figures for 1923 are not yet available Mr. Moore predicted that they would exceed that of 1922.

Rambler Found Dead. ASTORIA, Or.—The body of Frank Hill, who lived alone on a small ranch in the little Walla Walla river district, was found in his cabin by neighbors who went to call on him. The man evidently had been dead nearly a month as the papers in his mail box had not been removed in that time. Death

was caused by heart disease as he was preparing to retire. He deceased was a native of Pacific county, Washington, 52 years old and as far as known left no relatives.

Film Shown in Prison. Tickle Convict Inmates.

LONDON (AP)—For the first time in England the authorities have allowed "the movies" to be shown in a convict prison, and as a result eight hundred convicts of the Prison Trust jail laughed themselves hoarse over the adventures of leather convicts in an American prison, when the heroine wept and cheered over the happy ending.

The show was given in the prison chapel, the windows of which were heavily curtained, and during the interval selections were played by the prison band, composed, except for the conductor, entirely of convicts.

Several men who were serving life terms had never seen a film before, and the unraveling of the plot was watched with bated breath, punctuated with hilarious scenes when prison episodes were depicted.

Recla Mine Rescues. RICHIE, Ida. (AP)—The Recla mine, one of the world's largest lead producers, has remained open after its closure since July, 1922, when its shaft workings were destroyed by fire which swept over the town of Richie.

The mine opened with a crew of 450 men. Despite its idleness, it paid dividends in 1923 of \$1,150,000, part of which is accounted for under its insurance policy. Its total dividends at the end of 1923 had amounted to more than \$12,000,000.

RELIEF MEETING IS PLANNED FOR MONDAY, FEB. 4

WASHINGTON (AP)—Invitations have been issued to more than 50 representatives of interests affected by the agricultural situation in the northwest to meet in conference here next Monday to consider and advise on measures of relief.

Announcement was made at the White House Tuesday of those to whom invitations have been extended together with the statement that an effort had been made to secure, as far as possible, representatives of the farmers, of agriculture colleges, merchants, bankers, transportation, insurance and mortgage companies and members of Chambers of Commerce, including representatives of some national organizations of this character interested in this region.

Nevada Hospital Inmate Eats Himself to Death. AUSTIN, Nev. (AP)—The champion eater of Lander county, Leon Battalzo, is dead.

The only patient in the Lander county hospital for a year, Battalzo seemed to think that every meal was his last one. A breakfast of eight or ten eggs, half a loaf of bread, four or five cups of coffee, topped off with fifteen to twenty hot cakes, was common. A few weeks ago the inmate missed three pte. Battalzo explained that he had felt a "little hungry" in the afternoon and had eaten them.

The heavy eater also was a heavyweight, tipping the scales at 300 pounds. The county physician said death was due to overeating.

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"MAMMA" DOLLS ARE FULL; WINE FOUND IN INSIDE

KEY WEST, Fla. (I. N. S.)—Genuine blole dolls, with eyes that open and close—the kind that call "Mamma"—have assumed an unusual fascination for grown-ups in this city.

The reason for this unusual fascination was revealed here the other day when prohibition sleuths confiscated a large number of them in a raid on a local "speak-easy."

The dolls, which would have delighted most any little girl were intended to delight daddy instead, it was revealed.

An investigation proved that in the absence of the regulation stuffing each doll contained about a pint of real Spanish wine. The bottles were skillfully concealed under the dressing on the body and only the weight of the toy would arouse suspicion.

And thus it became known why these dolls were so popular here during the holidays, when scores of them were sold as toys.

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
