## MR. WILSON'S RECORD ONE OF RESULTS

University in 1882. In 1888 he became professor of history and political economy at Wesleyan University. In 1890 he went to Princeton as professor of jurisprudence and politics. He became president of the university in 1902.

In 1910 Wilson was elected governor of New Jersey. He carried out pre-election promises, forced through the legislature a direct primaries act, had enacted a corrupt practices act, and a workmen's compensation law.

Early in 1912 a Wilson boom was started to land him in the presidential chair. He traveled from coast to coast—in all 8000 miles—talking clean government and democracy. On the 4th ballot of the Baltimore convention Wilson was nominated.

The Republican party was split by Taft and Roosevelt and Wilson's election to the presidency resulted on Nov. 4, 1912.

He entered the White House March 4, 1912, succeeding William Howard Taft. The first serious problem confronting him was the Mexican situation.

As president he forced through the tariff revision, a graduated tax income, and federal reserve bank system which solved the currency problem. Voluntary demobilizations took the place of prosecutions in handling the trusts.

Mrs. Wilson had been in poor health for some time and died Aug. 6, 1914.

The Mexican situation was still at the boiling point when the clash of European nations flared up. Wilson undertook the gigantic task of guiding America through as a neutral. The Mexican situation caused the president to order mobilization of forces along the border in March, 1915.

In the fall of that year his engagement to Mrs. Edith Bolling Galt of Washington was announced. They were married Dec. 18, of that year.

In 1916—election year at hand—the Mexican situation reached a climax with the Villa raid across the border. Wilson sent "Black Jack" Pershing at the head of a punitive expedition into Mexico.

Despite the insults suffered at the hands of Germany, President Wilson still maintained the neutral attitude and the Democratic slogan in the campaign of 1916, "he kept us out of war," helped him win the presidency again.

Late in his first term of office the German situation became so alarming that President Wilson broke off diplomatic relations with Berlin. War was declared April 6, 1917.

On May 18 Wilson signed the selective service act, the passage of which made possible the raising of the world's greatest army in the shortest space of time and with fairness to all.

In an address before congress Jan. 8, 1918, Wilson named 14 peace terms which became famous the world over. Germany accepted them Oct. 6, 1918.

Following the armistice, Nov. 11,

1918, Wilson headed the American delegation to the Versailles peace conference, making two trips to France, returning finally July 3, 1919. He then began a tour of the country, championing the League of Nations. The furious pace at which he had been working began to tell on him. His voice broke in a speech he was delivering on the Pacific coast. A few days later he collapsed and was hurried east under the care of his personal physician, Admiral Grayson. He arrived home Sept. 30.

During his long illness that followed Congress rejected the League of Nations.

James M. Cox carried the league issue into the 1920 presidential campaign, only to be defeated by Warren G. Harding, for the presidency.

Wilson left the White House, March 4, 1921, he went to live in the home in S street, Washington, which he purchased for \$159,000. Here he spent the next years in quiet seclusion, fighting to overcome the partial paralysis of his left side.

Aside from glimpses caught on his frequent rides at hot climate at the theater, the public saw little of the war president. His public appearances were few. He participated in the ceremonies attending the burial of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington on Nov. 11, 1921, and—against the advice of his physician—rode in the procession which escorted the body of President Harding from the White House to the Capitol August 4, 1923.

war-time president, lies near his death in his home here today. He took a decided turn for the worse early today and Rear Admiral Grayson stated that his condition is regarded as very grave.

Digestive disorders, first noticed several days ago, developed during the night and are described by Mr. Grayson as "very serious." Members of his family have been summoned by Mrs. Wilson, who is in constant attendance at his bedside.

**May Operate**  
 Three physicians are in attendance, and it is believed that an operation may be necessary.

The attack brought on symptoms from which Wilson had suffered in a collapse in 1919.

Besides the physicians only a few of the former president's closest friends were admitted to his house.

**Death is Likely**  
 Vance McCormack, former chairman of the Democratic National Committee, leaving after a short talk today with Mrs. Wilson, said that death might come today or tonight say it's hands until tomorrow.

President Coolidge was one of the first to send a message of sympathy.

## LABBE ACTION MIMICKED HERE

**Motion Introduced in the Bloom Trial Early in Week Similar to Labbe "Quash" Action.**

An aftermath of the Clyde Bloom case tried before Judge Hugh Brady in the justice of peace court this week, came to light today that showed that methods employed in the celebrated Labbe case, recently before the Portland courts, were imitated in the case here but without success that crowned the defendant's attorney in the Rose City.

A motion was filed before Judge Brady early this week to quash the complaint against Bloom under which the search warrant was issued and that resulted in his arrest and the finding of two gallons of moonshine by the raising party.

Judge Brady refused to review the proceedings inasmuch as he was authorized for issuing the warrant following the receipt of complaints by the sheriff's office that appeared absolutely adequate for the issuance of a search warrant directed against Bloom.

Bloom was acquitted but not until a jury of six brought in a not guilty verdict.

**Returns Sufficient.**  
 "The return of the search warrant directed against Bloom," Judge Brady said, "were quite sufficient to uphold my action in issuing the warrant. I was notified by the sheriff that complaints had reached him from known parties that

liquor was being secreted in Bloom's room and when the return from the search came in it was found that two gallons of liquor had been found there.

"In the Labbe case in Portland the quashing of the complaint and the action preceding the quashing were similar to the action taken here," he continued. "But while the warrant in the Labbe case was issued due to an anonymous letter stating that a goodly amount of liquor was kept at his residence the warrant here was issued on reliable information secured from known sources. Also, only one pint of liquor was found in the Labbe residence while two gallons were found in Bloom's room."

After considering the different aspects of the case, Judge Brady unhesitatingly denied the motion to quash the complaint.
