at minutes when the spectators saw

ond team again took the floor and
during the last few minutes of the
game outplayed Enterprise. The

exactly 46 points against Enter-
prise's 7. La Grande's second team
scored 6 points to Enterprise's 13.

man for the visitors, scoring seven
