CORVALLIS, Ore. (Special)—Gaining renewed confidence from their comeback against Washington, the Aggie basketball team is facing the game with Oregon next Friday with optimism. The three quarter work-out smoothly and effectively against the Huskies. The fine condition of the players was apparent. A terrific pace was kept by both teams but in the last few minutes, the Aggies actually speeded up. This accounted for their scoring eight points while the visitors were collecting on in the last six minutes.

The Aggies head the conference now, but the scheduled game with Oregon Friday night is expected to prove their right to stay there, though Oregon has a dangerous combination, thinks Coach Hager. Every other team in the northern division of the Conference has been defeated by the Corvallis quintet and the Webfooters are the final hurdle to be cleared. Captain Gill has been in a class by himself in the last few games. The classy skipper has a habit of shaking guards and breaking through the defense for scores. If the veteran forward comes within 20 feet of the hoop the scorers' sheet flashes up a number. The playing of the orange team is in direct contrast to the style of the Huskies, who attempted shots from all positions on the floor. The Aggies played position and never attempted long shots, although some of their counters were reflected from seemingly impossible angles.

In Lacrosse the university has a hard fight ahead due to the decision of Laurel D. Cox, its wonder coach, to step aside, give up active direction of the game and merely assist now and then. But the Orange retains much of its veteran strength and will enter the race for collegiate honors on even terms with any of its rivals.

For collegiate baseball the outlook is fairly bright. Low Carr, Orange coach, brings two real holds up from last year's "fresh" in Percy and Ringwood, and Van Loon promises to give him the so-called "top-line" pitcher for whom he has sought for years.

Football is a long way ahead, not being due to swing around until September 1, except for a few weeks of spring practice, but it deserves more than a passing mention.

CROSS-COUNTRY COURSE FOR OLYMPIC A SECRET

NEW YORK (U. N. S.)—The cross-country course over which the Olympic cross-country championship will be decided next July will be kept a secret until the day of the race. This information came to the American Olympic committee from the French Olympic committee and was in response to a request made by Secretary Frederick W. Buehler for information as to the nature of the Olympic cross-country course. It is assured, however, that the course will not be very hilly, with practically no road running and that very short sprints may be used to advantage.

The American cross-country runners will be selected after the final tryout, which is scheduled for Van Courtlandt Park probably early in June. It is quite probable that the course over which last year's intercollegiate championship was held will be selected.

Biology Club Formed.

EUGENE.—The newest organization to be formed on the campus is a biology club by students in the department of medicine. Ray McKown of Marshfield is the organizer. He says the purpose of the organization is twofold.
