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MEASLES NOT SO BAD NOW

Epidemic on the Wane at Union—Scarlet Fever Has Only Hit One Home.

UNION, Ore. (Special).—A few more cases of measles are reported each week but the epidemic seems to be on the wane. Although Union has had a great number of cases of measles, one of scarlet fever, and several people seriously ill with pneumonia and flu, there have been no fatalities. The Reuter home was fumigated Saturday and it is believed that this will be our only case of scarlet fever.

Although the Imbler lads were playing at home and on a small floor, this advantage was more than offset by the size of the Union players, and the fact that they were older and more experienced. A good many personal fouls were called but this was unavoidable with ten men playing in so small a space. Coach Bouck used several of the second team during the last part of the game. Union was far ahead in all quarters of the contest and the final score was 66 to 32.

The girls' game was close and in doubt until the last five minutes of play, when Union finished with a lead of 4 points. Imbler's two guards were absent and this gave Union an advantage. The game ended with Union 34 points to Imbler's 20. Frank McKennon refereed both the boys' and the girls' games.

Connor, Johnny Martins, Ruth Connor, Mabel, Phyl, Audrey DeLap, Opal Gibson, Mr. Osborne, Floyd Churchill, and the two coaches, Bouck and Mr. Kelley. After the games the players, coaches, and other officials were

invited to the R. P. hall where the Imbler high school girls served sandwiches, chocolate, ice cream and cake.

Lo! The Rich Indian

There are worse states than being an Indian, especially if one is of the Osage tribe in Oklahoma. It wasn't an Osage of who Pope spoke in his "Essay on Man." Both the Osages closely resemble white folks in one respect—the more they have the more they want. At present each family is drawing \$14,000 a year income from oil, and that is not enough, they think, to maintain their position in Indian society. A delegation is now in Washington asking increased allowances. The government does not permit them to spend their money as fast as it comes in. About two-thirds of the annual return is deposited at interest, lest a day come when the oil wells cease to yield so bountifully.

In most ways these Indians are just like white people. They have big automobiles and find that it costs much to maintain them. When they go to Washington they hire suites in the highest-priced hotels. They are able to pay, too. They are convinced that money was made to spend and thus they tally with many pale faces. Thus we discern that Indians take to the ways of civilization if that is what we are living amidst. The Indian's "untutored mind" is amenable to tutoring in certain directions not less aptly than the white man's. He may stick to his blanket as an article of apparel but he appreciates what money commands in a physical sense. The latter is the only use many white men have for money.
