"AGREEMENT" INCIDENT IS REGRETTED

(Continued from page 1) fault is MacDonald's. The former premier Clemenceau read the text of Lloyd George's statement he said "If Lloyd George will produce the secret agreement between Wilson and me, I will pay the reparation."

LONDON, (AP) — The London newspapers are making a sensation out of Mr. Lloyd George's statement in an interview with the Associated Press Sunday last. That an agreement existed between Mr. Wilson and M. Clemenceau regarding the French occupation of the Rhineland, of which the then English premier was unaware until the French government sought permission to publish the memorandum. The Evening Standard in a double column story refers to Mr. Lloyd George's statement as a "disclosure which could not easily have been made public during Mr. Wilson's lifetime."

The British foreign office, however, which is preparing an explanation throws cold water on the story by saying that the so-called secret agreement was nothing more than a routine memorandum which the French government was seeking to publish in ordinary course. Exaggeration Charged. Officials expressed the belief that Mr. Lloyd George's statement has become greatly exaggerated since it was first made to the Associated Press. They point out that documents to which he referred as having been secret in only one of many memoranda exchanged among the big four during the protracted negotiations regarding the Rhineland issue at the time and exchanged memoranda with their colleagues. It was during this period that the British premier returned to London to look after important political developments. The theory is advanced that in the multiplicity of documents he was called to consider, Mr. Lloyd George failed to remember specifically the memorandum respecting an occupation of the Rhineland which had passed between M. Clemenceau and Mr. Wilson.

Lloyd George's Charges. Throughout the hour's conversation with the Associated Press on Sunday the former premier did not appear to desire that a sensation be made of the Wilson-Clemenceau memorandum. The subject arose while he was discussing Mr. Wilson's character, his difficulties in Paris and how events transpired to cause him at times to sacrifice idealism for allied agreement on various clauses of the treaty. One such instance had come to his attention, Mr. Lloyd George said, if

was the agreement between Wilson and Clemenceau regarding the occupation of the Rhineland, the details of which he said he had never been acquainted with, that in fact he never knew that such a memorandum had also passed between Mr. Wilson and M. Clemenceau on that subject on the previous day when he had received an inquiry from the British foreign office seeking permission on behalf of France for publication of the memorandum. The copy of the memorandum in question accompanied the inquiry.

Mr. Lloyd George said that this was the first intimation he had that a Rhineland understanding between Wilson and Clemenceau had been embodied on paper. That he knew of the existence at least of a verbal understanding between Mr. Wilson and Clemenceau on the Rhineland question seems amply borne out by the fact that such a stipulation subsequently was incorporated in the Versailles treaty.

At the foreign office Wednesday night it was stated that only Mr. Lloyd George's permission was awaited before allowing the French government that there was no British objection to publication. According to official circles here there can be no question of the French government's intention not to publish the memorandum until after Mr. Wilson's death. The French request for permission to publish in event of Mr. Wilson's death came in Lloyd George's hands the Friday before Mr. Wilson died.

Under these powers the secretary of the navy was charged with the duty of protecting the oil thus confined to his care. In carrying out the will of congress, I had three courses open to me: (1) To do nothing and guard what would have been ultimately an empty shell because most of the oil would have been drained away from it. (2) To endeavor to create the machinery for handling the situation under the navy department by governmental drilling, etc., or (3) To leave the right to drill under proper conditions to private enterprise. In the explanation of this last course I had two alternatives, one to leave the drilling privilege and have paid into the treasury the value of the royalty oil belonging to the navy under such leasing contract, or to retain and preserve the oil above the surface, since it could not be preserved below for the use and benefit of the United States."
