Committee. Chairman Green will submit the Republican report but an additional one will be sent in by the 11 Republicans of the committee who voted for the Mellon rates arguing more vigorously than the chairman for the maximum surtax rate of 25 per cent. Representative Fenn, Wisconsin Republican insurgent, already has made public another report in which he argues against any reduction in the surtax rates and for a greater cut in the nominal rates. The Democratic report will demand lower tax rates and the higher surtax rates than carried by the bill and additional exemptions.

Republicans through Representative Longworth, Ohio, the floor leader, have admitted the Mellon surtax rates are doomed. Mr. Longworth conveyed this message to President Coolidge Saturday at Representative Hays, Ohio, had completed a poll of the Republican membership. Mr. Hays announced a maximum surtax rate between 25 and 40 per cent of the profits and that about 25 or 27 per cent would be sufficient.

The senate has agreed to vote late Monday on the resolution calling for the resignation of Secretary Denby for his part in the naval oil leases and leaders are hopeful of getting to consideration of the first of the supply bill. The interior department approval bill—before the end of the week. Several other resolutions growing out of the oil inquiry are pending, however. Except for farm and railroad legislation, the program of congress is being directed by the two leaders. The leaders plan to take up in order the immigration bill, Omaha schools and soldiers' bonus after the tax bill is out of the way. Meanwhile, however, the departmental appropriation bills will be pressed as rapidly as they are reported by the appropriations committee.

An ye-house leaders have made so provision for consideration for farm and railroad legislation. These two problems may reach the senate first. The senate agricultural committee already has agreed to the Norbeck-Burns farm legislation measure and is expected soon to approve the Norris-Snyder export—corporation bill or a measure incorporating the principal provisions of that bill and the McNary-Haugen export bill.

Consideration of railroad legislation will be started this week by the senate. Interests in commerce committee but early reports on some of the principal measures for amendment of the transportation act is expected since arrangements have been made to hold rather extensive hearings.

Brazil Affords Foreigners Better Patent Protection

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, CAP—A new law governing patents on inventions went into effect in Brazil last month. In the words of the minister of agriculture, commerce and industry, who instigated the change, it "will protect the public as well as the inventor."

Under the former law patents were registered in each of the 21 Brazilian states and if the manufacturer, foreign or domestic, failed to register his rights in any state he exposed no protection in that state. The new law requires one registration with the federal government, which protects the patent throughout the country.

The new law is expected to be of special service to foreign manufacturers, who formerly had difficulty in protecting their products exported to Brazil.

Glasgow to Have Large Dock

GLASGOW, CAP—Glasgow is to have the largest dock in Great Britain. It will cost \$10,000,000, cover 40 acres of water and will accommodate the largest vessels to reach this port.

miners' camp with their demand for a reduction in wages, in some quarters this is not seriously regarded.

Representatives of the Federal Department of Labor who are here watching the progress of the negotiations pointed out that during the 20-year period, 1909-1919, Geological Survey reports gathered from the coal operators' strikes in coal mines resulted in the loss of 124,747,125 man days. In the same time in the same mines there were lost 1,953,576,999 man days through no market, transportation difficulties or breakdowns at the mines. These figures show that 19.5 per cent of the total loss in the coal mining operation in 20 years was due to strikes, while 80.5 per cent loss during the same time was due to other causes than strikes and lockouts.
