Income Tax Tips
No. 18.
Contributions to the United States, any state, territory, or political sub-division thereof—city, town, county, or hamlet—or to the District of Columbia for exclusively public purposes are deductible from gross income to an extent not in excess of 15 per cent of the taxpayer's income, computed without the benefit of this deduction.

The value of real estate presented to a city to be maintained perpetually as a public park is an allowable deduction. Subscriptions by citizens to a fund raised for the purpose of inducing an industrial plant to locate in their city would not be allowable deductions.

Deductions, limited as above, are also allowable for contributions to corporations, community chests, funds or foundations organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes, including posts of the American Legion, or the women's auxiliary units thereof, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private stockholder or individual, and the special fund for vocational rehabilitation.

Every church constitutes a religious corporation or organization for the purpose of this deduction. Contributions to missionary funds, church building, pew rents, and assessments and dues paid to churches are deductible.

Deductions for contributions to political campaign purposes are not allowable. Amounts spent for lobbying purposes, the promotion or defeat of legislation and for propaganda purposes including advertising other than trade advertising, are not deductible.

Deductions may not be made for gift of items to an individual (or the relief of poverty or distress) but if made to an organization of the kind described above may be deducted even though the organization distributes its fund among such beneficiaries. Deductible contributions have been construed to mean money or property. The value of services to the organizations mentioned is not allowed as a deduction.
