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## Income Tax Tips

Deductions for taxes form a considerable item in the returns of many taxpayers. Such items include taxes on personal property and real estate, whether business or residential. Taxes assessed against local benefits, such as street paving or drainage, which tend to increase the value of the property assessed, are not deductible, since they are the cost of a permanent improvement.

The Federal income tax may not be deducted. Other Federal taxes, however, are deductible; for example, the special taxes of oligarchic dealers, proprietors of theatres, pool rooms, bowling alleys, customhouse brokers, and stockbrokers. Customs duties paid by a person on articles which he imports for his own use are deductible. Sales taxes paid by manufacturers of automobiles, canoes, pleasure boats, works of art, carpets, trunks, jewelry, etc., may not be deducted by such manufacturers, unless included in gross income for the year. A purchaser of such articles can not deduct the taxes as they are levied against the manufacturer and not the purchaser.

Automatic license fees are regarded as taxes, and the amount thereof may be deducted. Admission taxes are deductible, but the taxpayer must show that account has been kept of the amount paid during the year. Mere guesswork will not be accepted.

**Citizenship Denied Aliens.**  
ASTORIA, Or.—Three men who had made false affidavits that they were citizens of the United States in order to obtain fishing licenses and who had claimed exemption from military duty during the late war on the ground of being an alien, met hard meddling in the circuit court when their applications for admission to citizenship were denied with prejudice, and they cannot become citizens for five years at least. Karl Fredrik Lundstrom and Adrian Krook and Laitenkorva, natives of Finland, and Max Vlastelica, a native of Serbia, were the men.

### U. S. Model Traction Law Starts Bulgarian Row

SOFIA, (INS)—A treason law patterned after America's treason and sedition laws, is being bitterly debated in the Bulgarian National Assembly. The law, designed to counteract the activities of the Communist and Agrarian parties, has the support of a coalition of five parties opposing the Communists and the Agrarians. Bulgarian newspapers have been warning the coalition by printing the American law and comparing it with the proposed Bulgarian law.

## MEERSCHAUM IS BELIEVED FOUND NEAR LEWISTON

LEWISTON, Idaho, (AP)—Considerable interest is being manifested over the discovery of deposits of a clay-like mineral apparently possessing nearly all of the elements composing the Asia Minor meerschaum. The deposits were located on the upper Clearwater river and Polkatch creek near here.

Samples from the deposit brought to Lewiston have been turned into pipes, cigar and cigarette holders by Patrick Gibbons of this city and are being tested by various smokers.

According to Mr. Gibbons, the specific gravity of the substance is less than water but the color is yellowish white instead of the bleached white of the European and Asiatic mineral.

Recent investigations indicate that there is a large supply of the substance. Mr. Gibbons said, and topographic features favor the working of the deposits.
