MONTANA (AP)—Residents of Montana are to be afforded opportunity to express themselves at the polls as to whether or not they favor restoration of a monarchy as part of the program of the People's party. It was announced recently that a motion picture within boundaries of the German republic is entirely practicable, and that the issue has been raised because they believe that it is in accordance with the wishes of a large proportion of the voting electorate.

From present indications a 13 parties will have candidates in the field at the election which is planned to hold some time next fall.

Montana Triumphs in War on Grasshoppers

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—Although the cost of Montana's campaign during 1923 to combat the grasshopper menace was \$125,000, the saving of grain crops within the state due to this campaign was about \$1,000,000. The campaign was waged by the United States Bureau of Entomology, and the results were gleaned from a report prepared by Stewart Lockwood, the entomologist, who directed the war on the pests. The peak of the menace in Montana in 1923, it is believed, but it is recommended that a similar campaign must be carried on in 1924 in that part of the state west of the Rocky Mountains.
