GOOD ROAD IS TO BE ASKED

Fruitdale Meeting Results in Drawing Up of Petition to Be Given to County Court.

A very enthusiastic good roads meeting was held in Fruitdale at the home of Homer Wilson. The object of the meeting was to devise some means of repairing the county road leading from Fruitdale to the market road north from Island City a distance of about two miles, this road being impassable in the fall and spring for cars and not safe for light horse-drawn vehicles. There were 30 present, there being a representative from almost every family living along this road and also those who use same at all times of the year, and all present unanimously agreed that this road was in such condition that the only economical way to repair it was to properly grade and gravel it.

A petition was properly drawn up petitioning the county court of Union County for the grading and graveling of this road, and signed by all present, same to be placed before the county court at their next meeting.

After the meeting enjoyable refreshments were served by Mrs. Wilson.

Dismiss Complaint Charges

PORTLAND (AP)—Complaint charges against Cyril G. CIVIL SERVICE EXAM TO BE HELD

The United States Civil Service Commission announces a postoffice clerk-carrier examination, to be held on March 15, 1924, for the purpose of establishing an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of clerk or carrier, postoffice service, La Grande, Oregon. Salary, \$1400 per annum, subsistence free for house.

All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Age limits, 18 to 45 years, on the date of the examination. Age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service.

friend and he "wanted to clear his memory," he said. When questioned about his statement that the senate committee did not dare push the questioning of Fall, Vanderlip said it was his impression gleaned from the newspapers.

He admitted he had not read that Fall claimed constitutional immunity.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vanderlip also said he did not associate the sale of the Marion Star with the oil scandal and said he had never heard of a "million-dollar slush fund" until the papers printed it today.

He declined to give the names of persons telling him of rumors.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Louis H. Brush, past owner of the Marion Star, gave the oil committee details of the purchase of the newspaper from Harding. He said he and Roy D. Moore were the sole purchasers and that the funds were his own excepting a part borrowed from Ohio banks. The Star stock was hypothecated as collateral, he testified.
