MANY NATIONS BIDDING FOR RUSSIAN TRADE

MOSCOW, (HNS)—Trade-buffs of Europe apparently are turning toward Russia in their efforts to rebuild the structure of international commerce that was torn down during the war. Encouraged apparently by the new economic policy of the Soviet Government, which permits the operation of private business enterprises, virtually every nation in Europe is endeavoring to negotiate agreements with the Soviet authorities that will enable them to participate in the future development of Russian commerce.

Bulgaria and Romania Move To Patch Up War-Time Rancor

BUCHAREST, (CAP)—Negotiations are in progress here which, it is hoped, will remove the last obstacle to friendly relations between Bulgaria and Romania, broken off as a result of Bulgarian operations in Romania during the World war.

One of the most important problems has been solved, in principle, by Bulgaria agreeing to pay up approximately 120,000,000 leva for release of the Romanian claim on the property of Bulgarian citizens seized here after the war. The question of restitution by Bulgaria for war requisitions in Romania during the war is still pending and proving more difficult of solution.
