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AMERICA PROVES SILVER TRADER'S BUYING CENTER

NEW YORK (AP).—Shifting of the silver market of the world, London to New York, is in progress, according to bullion and silver exchange experts, who expect that supremacy in the market is slowly, but surely, passing from Great Britain to the United States.

Increased transportation costs made possible by direct shipments of silver from the country to the United States, the largest consumers of the metal, have helped about the change. Foreign American shipments were made in large volume to London, from where shipment was made to the United States.

Total silver exports from the United States direct to the Far East in 1923 amounted to \$6,000,000, against \$9,000,000 in the preceding year, while London shipped only \$7,000,000 in ounces, of which \$6,000,000 were shipments from the United States.

Despite the shifting basis of bullion trade, with India and China, moving London, with its long history of silver and silver exchange, an advantage, the New York market, which has the attraction of offering shipping charges to all other buyers. New York also has been helped by the broadening of the market in Far Eastern exchange, the risks of which have been shifted to London.

London's experience of several hundred years and its more extensive facilities for handling bullion, however, have not enabled it to hold the position for silver trading position for so long, experts believe.

At the same time, they assert, the London market is at a disadvantage because it can no longer obtain from continental Europe large quantities of silver coin to be melted down and resold, a process which since 1915 has added to the city's silver supply.

The United States, on the other hand, is benefited by its own large production, which has been stepped up by an increased output from lead, zinc and copper companies, which are also silver producers. Creation of purchases by the government under the Pittman act also has made more silver available for export.

MONEY LOST BY U. S. IN MOVING FOREIGN MAILS

WASHINGTON (AP).—The United States is preparing to send a delegation from its postoffice department to the quadrennial meeting of the Universal Postal Union congress at Stockholm, Sweden, which begins June 4 and will continue its deliberations several weeks. Various important questions relating to the detailed conduct of international postal affairs for the ensuing four years will be determined by the congress.

One question will be the equitable adjustment for the payment of transfers of foreign mail across the United States, as well as across foreign countries. Postal officials here point out that England is able to collect as much from the United States for shipping a carload of American mail from Southampton to London, for export across the North Sea, as the American government can collect for taking a carload of English mail from New York to San Francisco for shipment to Australia.

Practically all of the countries of the world are members of the Universal Postal Union and will be represented at the congress. Assistant Postmaster General Henderson, speaking of the matter of transfer of mail recently, declared if the United States could get approximately what it costs to transport the English and other foreign mails across the American continent when in transit to the Pacific countries there would be a difference of about \$1,000,000 a year in the American postal service's transportation expenses.

RUMANIAN DEBTS TO BE COLLECTED

BUCHAREST, Rumanian. (AP).—Progress is being made in the matter of funding the trade debts contracted in foreign currencies by Rumanian importers during the three years immediately following the war. Agreements were reached in 1923 with British, Swiss and French creditors for refunding operations to extend over periods ranging from 20 to 25 years. Italian interests also are seeking a method of adjustment, but Belgian, Czech and Dutch creditors appear to be taking no concerted action.

Nothing, however, has apparently yet been done to bring American creditors as a body into touch with the so-called "Commission for Regulating the Payment of Foreign Commercial Indebtedness Contracted in 'Strong' Currencies," which makes its headquarters at the National Bank of Rumania, and of which Mr. Gromula, the governor of the National Bank, is chairman. Many American exporters are known to have substantial claims outstanding against Rumanian merchants, and attempts have been made by several of them to have recourse to the courts for settlement. But a form of moratorium law still is in effect here, preventing court action by foreign commercial creditors against their Rumanian debtors.

Rumanians apparently feel that, if they are to save many of their most important commercial houses from bankruptcy, they must be accorded legal protection in the settlement of their foreign debts. They have announced that they are quite ready to discuss terms of settlement with the creditors of any country if they, the creditors, will get together and appoint representatives with power to act, either independently or with the co-operation of their diplomatic representatives in Bucharest.

The foregoing has nothing to do with the foreign indebtedness of the government; only private merchants are concerned.

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP).—For one home breaker, 19 days vacation for one hold-up man, 20 days vacation. Such are the benefits that will accrue to Charleston policemen who capture and obtain conviction of the criminals who have plumed their feathers in a series of burglaries and robberies. The rewards have been promised by Chief of Police John Britton, who includes in his campaign some advice to Charleston citizens.

"Keep a gun handy for house-breakers," is part of the advice, which also urges keeping houses locked at night. Another request is that citizens "speak up" both prompt and accurate in giving information to the police concerning crimes or attempted crimes, and in this connection he pointed to a recent instance, when, he
