## LOVE LETTERS JAIL BANDIT

### Terror of Slavonia Finally Trapped When His Billet Doux Was Intercepted.

BEGRAD, (INS)—Jovo Carug, the terror of Slavonia, is in jail in Belgrade. The Slavonian peasants are devoutly hoping that the Belgrade justice is strong enough to hold him, but they have little doubt.

"No house is safe from Jovo Carug," the peasants say. "Jovo Carug can get through any wall, no matter how thick." Those sayings are provverbs in Slavonia. They are the reasons why the Slavonian peasants are skeptical about Jovo remaining in Belgrade for any great length of time. The jailers at Belgrade, however, declare they have Jovo where they long have wanted him and are going to keep him there.

Throughout a highly industrious and somewhat picturesque career of banditry, Jovo Carug has amply justified the fearsome respect which the Slavonian peasants have for his iniquitous prowess. He has confessed to seven murders, eighteen robberies and a few lesser crimes. The authorities contend that Jovo hasn't told half the story.

### King of Bandits

For years Jovo has been a bandit king. He has terrorized Slavonia, which is that section of Yugoslavia lying between the rivers Save and Danube. Although he has not confined himself to any particular line of crime, his specialty seems to have been setting fire to a building and then robbing the homes of the peasants when they rushed out to extinguish the fire. If murder was necessary to the carrying out of his schemes, Jovo never seemed to hesitate, and such trivial crimes as arson, or a hold-up now and then never bothered him at all.

Carug made his home at Vinkevo, about 100 miles from Belgrade, and there he was known as Pirzic, an army contractor. This was merely a cloak of respectability concealing the garments of banditry.

Lake Alana, Rimson and other noted legendary and historical figures, a woman was the cause of Jovo's downfall. It was letters written to his sweetheart, Manda, a liaison peasant girl, that led to his arrest.

Carug's designs on the bankroll of a wealthy farmer near Vinkevo, he disguised himself as a cattle dealer, assumed the name of Boric and made the farmer's acquaintance, eventually becoming a guest in his home. One night a band of robbers looted the farmer's house and stole his money, but no one suspected the hand was Carug's. He stayed a few days longer to avert all suspicion and then went away.

### Fell in Love

While visiting the farmer, Jovo met Manda, and they fell in love. He also noted that the harvest would soon be reaped and that, with its sale, the farmer would have more money.

After he left, Jovo wrote many fervent love letters to Manda and occasionally visited her. Meanwhile he perfected his plan to raid the farmer's house by setting fire to his barn and then, while his peasants were fighting the flames, robbed the farmhouse and others nearby. Something happened, however, to prevent Carug participating in this robbery in person and for once his hand failed to carry out his orders.

Not hearing any news of his proposed coup, Carug wrote to Manda asking if there had been any harvest in the neighborhood recently. It so chanced that a barn had been burned, and the police were investigating. They decided to open some letters, and one of them happened to be Carug's epistle to Manda.

### Note Intercepted

Carug and Manda were both arrested, but the authorities supposed that the man they had seen Boric the cattle dealer. They had no idea they had captured Carug.

Boric, the cattle dealer. They had the notorious bandit, for whom a reward of \$5000 had been offered. A former army sergeant, however, was asked by Manda to see if he could not do something to help her sweetheart. He went to see him in jail, and something about the prisoner's face struck him as familiar. He pondered and recalled a day when the farm where he once had worked had been robbed by Carug, the bandit. The treasurer, he decided, was Carug.

### Hints for the Housewife

A Delicious Mint Jelly For Meats. Many housewives have learned, from government bulletins or otherwise, about peetin, which is the active constituent which makes jelly jelly. They also know how peetin can be added to the juices of fruits which are deficient in this respect, thus insuring perfect jellies.

But home-made peetin has other uses as well. For instance, with the addition of a little flavoring matter, it makes an ideal mint jelly to serve with lamb and other meats, whether hot or cold. There are two kinds of peetin, that made with apples and that made with the white skin of oranges and lemons. For this jelly it is best to use the white skin of oranges. It may be seen that the cost will be very slight, as the oranges themselves are not employed but may be put to other purposes, such as making marmalade, orange juice, etc.

After boiling the mixture for five minutes, put it aside until the next morning, when you must add six cups of water and boil for ten minutes. Cool and strain through a flannel jelly bag. Measure the juice and put it on the stove again; when it boils add very slowly an equal amount of sugar, continue to boil the jelly until it "sheets" when tested from a spoon. Add some green vegetable coloring and mint, according to taste. Pour into hot sterilized glasses and, after cooling, cover with melted paraffin and seal.
