LOCAL DEALER ATTENDS MEET

Harris F. French, manager of the La Grande branch of the Columbia Tire Corporation, has just returned from Portland where he attended the annual meeting of the stockholders and heard the reports of the officers.

"The annual meeting of the Columbia Tire Corporation," Mr. French said, "held at its plant in Portland on the 12th brought out many important phases of development of this new industry in the Northwest. It was disclosed that, though the first year of the Corporation's existence had brought C-T-C tires into the market against the most virulent competition of the tire prices existing war of 1923, when between 70 and 80 of the Eastern tire concerns failed, the Corporation pulled through without the loss of a single penny, and was able to compare with the current liabilities at a ratio of sixty to one, and that the distribution and sale of C-T-C tires is far ahead of the most optimistic anticipations of its builders.

"It will be remembered that C-T-C tires first made their appearance on the market just a year ago, after having been announced as the development of a group of nationally known tire engineers who for five years previous had been putting the C-T-C tire through all stages of development and design, experimental work and thorough testing with a view of putting on the market a tire which would carry lower inflation than that so long recommended in other standard cords, and it was proclaimed that no small part of motoring economy and satisfaction would be achieved, it was announced, by the building of a stronger tire with heavier side-walls and an improved compounding, bringing in to use only the best rubbers, hand-combed long staple cotton and other materials obtainable.

Hand-building also is said to play a large part in the special qualities claimed for the endurance of C-T-C tires and their ability to withstand rough usage. The low inflation principle utilized in C-T-C cords does not necessitate a change in either rim or wheel equipment of standard cars, more severe motoring conditions and longer distances of the West."

C-T-C tires are handled in La Grande by the Pacific Oil Company as well as by the Corporation's branch.

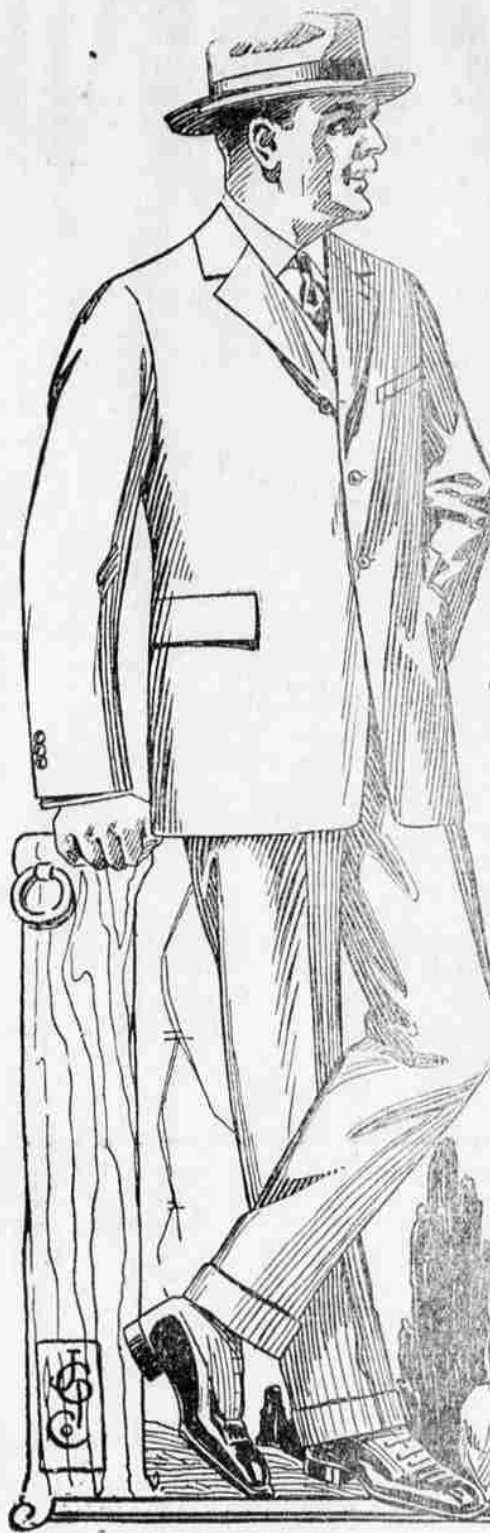

that an official of the treasury department had verified my statement and figures which were sent out earlier in the day." These figures were those contained in Mr. Miller's remarks about variations in treasury estimates.

Before Mr. Miller's last letter to him had been received, Secretary Mellon, who had appeared to be disturbed by accounts of the property custodian's speech in New York, had sent to him a letter demanding to know the name of the "high treasury official" quoted, and declaring that the charge was false. He also remarked that "we have had within the past week an example of a man of public prominence who made statements in a speech without verification of their accuracy" and that such cases should be promptly dealt with. In reply to this Mr. Miller merely said he noted "your reference to the statements made by a man of public prominence within the past week and it just happens that a reference was made to my

office in that same gentleman's remarks."

"Replying specifically to your letter," Mr. Miller said, "please be advised that the position of my remarks of Monday contained inaccuracies and even to the extent of quoting, as a part of my remarks, the remarks of other speakers who were present. I did not state that a high official of your department had told me anything."

He added that he referred to a conversation with a prominent United States Senator "whose name will be revealed to you with his permission, but it has objects to my so doing."

Will Not Retract.
In his earlier statement which he did not retract, Mr. Miller went over various treasury estimates on the spot of a bonus. He mentioned that President Harding had issued a compensation increase because he believed the country was facing a deficit of \$200,000,000.

"Yet," he added, "in the same

fiscal year, the government paid \$421,000,000 of the government debt and still the treasury ended the fiscal year 1922-23 with a balance to its credit of \$274,000,000. He showed a discrepancy in these figures of \$1,000,000,000 within the space of a few months."

Mr. Mellon's letter to Mr. Miller supplemented a statement he had made Sunday night in which he said he was "amused" at the House for the time being at least.
