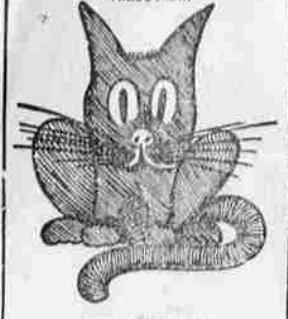

Mining Dredge Costly.  
BAKER, Ore.—The mammoth  
gold-dredging dredge of the Super-  
ior Dredge Mining company on  
Burnt river below Bridgeport, be-  
ing constructed at a cost of more  
than \$250,000, is nearing comple-  
tion and will be in operation by  
March 15, it is stated.  
This mining dredge, when com-  
pleted, will be the largest in the  
west and will be used in that dis-  
trict to extract gold from the  
ground, which officials claim is un-  
usually rich in metal value.

## SPORT NEWS

### Fred Steiwer's Talk

Those who attended the Chamber of Commerce luncheon  
yesterday and heard Fred Steiwer of Pendleton discuss  
the soldiers' adjusted compensation bill came away with  
a lot of information they did not before possess. Instead  
of scattering a bundle of cash broadcast over the United  
States as has been indicated the most cash any soldier  
can obtain is \$50.

There are four distinct features of the bill. First, the  
service man whose time of service at rates laid down would  
entitle him to \$50 or less must take cash settlement be-  
cause of the cost of carrying on accounts of so small a  
nature.

Second, the adjusted service certificate which credits  
the service man with his time on a twenty-year endow-  
ment life insurance policy. Third, the vocational training  
feature which enables soldiers who were taken from school  
life to continue and finish their education. Fourth, the  
farm or home aid feature which enables soldiers to own  
homes or make payments on farm lands.

Mr. Steiwer brought out the fact that so few people  
understand the adjusted compensation bill it is little won-  
der there is opposition to it. And he further stated that  
Secretary of the Treasury Mellon had not only stated in-  
correct figures but that he had revised the figures several  
times, each time throwing a greater scare into the people  
of the nation.

Without doubt after Mr. Steiwer's clean-cut presenta-  
tion of the case, after he had reviewed the government's  
attitude toward its civil employes following the war where-  
in additional compensation was awarded them, after he  
had told of the war contracts where contractors had been  
made whole by the government and in many instances paid

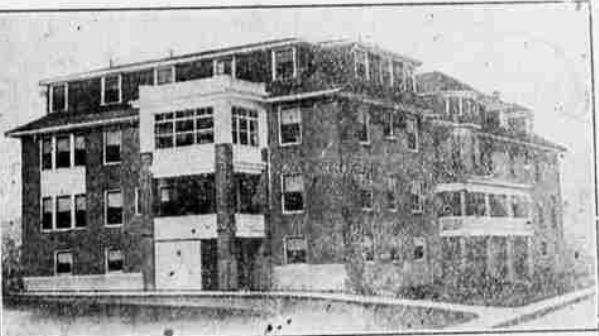
