STEIWER, KIDDLE EXPLAIN BONUS TO BUSINESS MEN

Interest compounded annually. This would come to 2045 the value of the adjusted service credit. Adjusted service certificates would have a loan value on the following basis: For the first three years the certificate holder would be allowed to borrow from a bank 85 per cent of the value of his adjusted service credit plus the interest thereon at 4 1/2 per cent compounded annually. From three to six years following issuance of the certificate he could borrow 80 per cent of his credit plus interest, after six years 57 1/2 per cent plus interest. In case of failure to make payments on these loans when due the veteran would not lose his certificate. The Secretary of the Treasury would be required to take them up and veterans would have the option of redeeming them by paying loan and interest, this provision to remain in effect during the twenty-year life of the certificate.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING AID. This provision allows the veteran to apply his adjusted service credit, computed in this nation at \$1.75 a day, to complete an education interrupted by the war.

FARM OR HOME AID. Veterans who wish to make improvements on city or suburban homes, or purchase or make payments on city homes or farms, or pay off landed indebtedness may receive for this specific purpose adjusted service credits based on length of service increased by twenty-five per cent.

Steiwert Talks Frankly
 The speaker of the occasion, Fred Steiwert, of Pendleton, was introduced and received a fine ovation for Mr. Steiwert is well known to most of the people of this city.

He told of the days of war preparation, how the men marched to station with the pledge of the people who remained at home that nothing was too good for the soldier, and then he questioned that statement as readily meant by many at the time it was made.

The speaker spoke with extreme frankness relative to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, who is the opponent of the adjusted compensation measure in congress. Mr. Steiwert, with his careful legal mind, had secured the different sets of figures which Mr. Mellon used to frighten the people relative to the soldier bill, and he found that four times had the official of the treasury changed these figures, each time increasing the total amount.

"If it is a case of reducing taxes in the nation or having the adjusted compensation," said Mr. Steiwert, "the service men will say let us have tax reduction. But such is not the case and by Mellon's own figures we can show where, if the surtax on the 22,222,222 large incomes is not cut, all other tax reductions can be made and we can still have the compensation law."

Deep study has been given this legislation by Steiwert for he is a republican all the time and does not want to fall out with the old

administration. He goes on, however, that Mr. Coolidge will see the truth of Mr. Mellon's stand, which Mr. Steiwert frankly stated, was a stand of the dollar, a stand of extremely rich who wishes reduction on income, who wishes all money phases of the government to be met with great promptness, but who fails because of his soul being steeped in big business consistency, to view the debt to the fighting men which the country owes.

"That debt is not for bravery, not for courage, not for wearing the uniform, not for bearing the hardships of war, but it is a plain debt for time which the country took from each man in the service and for which compensation was not given in comparison with the pay given the man who staid at home," said the speaker.

LELANDS LOSE DIVORCE SUIT; PASTOR CLEARED

CHICAGO, Ill.—Denial of the suit for divorce by Albert C. Leland against Mrs. Florence Leland occurred here Tuesday afternoon, when Superior Judge Foot denied the suit.

Mrs. Florence Leland implicated the Reverend Carl D. Case, pastor of the First Baptist church of Oak Park, in her alleged indiscretions. The decision, in effect, clears Case of the charges made by Leland and his wife.


