## Washington Defeats Idaho U. 29 to 18

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—University of Washington's basketball quintet remained in the running for the pennant of the northern section of the Pacific coast basketball conference here Wednesday night by defeating the University of Idaho, 29 to 18. The victory gives the Huskies a percentage of .714 or 34 points below the University of Oregon, which leads the list. Idaho is tied with Washington State with a percentage of .429.

PARIS, (AP)—Charles Ledoux, defeated Edouard Mascart, on points in a 20-round match, winning the featherweight championship of France and Europe. Mascart's showing was a keen disappointment. The defeat of Mascart probably will cause him to forego his proposed journey to the United States. He had intended to leave for New York in March.

## YOUNG TWIRLER WITH PITTSBURG THOUGHT COMER

NEW YORK (AP)—Although he never pitched a baseball game as a professional until July, 1922, Earl Yds was called to the major league fold in the fall of 1923, a little more than a year later. He was obtained by the Pittsburgh club of the National League on the remarkably record he had made as a minor leaguer. Starting 47 games with Oklahoma City in the Western League last season, he won 28 and lost 12. He took part in a total of 59 games, having been used outside the box because of his prowess as a hitter, and compiled a batting average of .352.

Yds won nine games in a four year career, losing five times by one run, because of an error behind him. In the winter months he is physical director of the Frooport, Ill. Y. M. C. A. He attended Illinois and Wisconsin Universities. The Pirates expect him to prove a tower of strength to the pitching staff this year in spite of his lack of major league experience.
