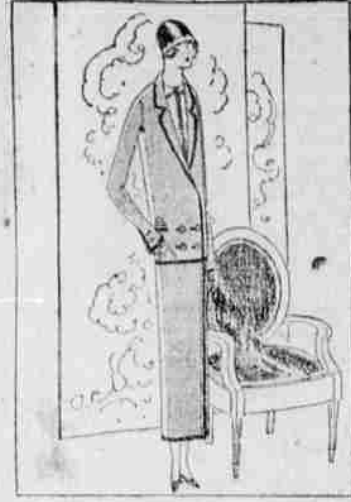

Hints for the Housewife

How to Make English Toffee.
Speaking of children, was there ever a child who didn't like toffee? If some of these old-fashioned candies were made at home there would be fewer cases of spoiled stomachs in our households and fewer young men and women who take tablets for "indigestion."

The best toffee is made in this manner: Mix four cups of brown sugar and a half cup of corn syrup with half a cup of water, and put on the fire, stirring carefully until all the sugar is dissolved. Let this come to a boil and then take off the fire and add four tablespoons of butter. Put the mixture back on the stove once more and boil until the butter has evaporated throughout the candy. Pour into a greased shallow tin tray of any kind and, as the candy cools, mark it into squares. When it has hardened break these apart and wrap each piece separately in wax paper. Incidentally, you will find that the labor of "cleaning up" is a good deal less if you have used an enameled saucepan for the cooking, since even the stickiest mixtures do not adhere long to its porcelain-like surface.

The reason for the holding up of this home was the number of homeless children for which no fit housing and care was provided either by the state or by Protestant institutions. No distinction is made between the homeless children of different religious denominations. The management of the home is Christian without being denominational. Unquestionably the state of Oregon needs such a home and needs it greatly. This home is not self-sustaining, and can never be, any more than any orphanage can be. But it seems to have a good native behind it, a good start, a good location for a home of this sort and good management in its present activities. It deserves a good support at the hands of the people of the state.

THE CHILDREN'S FARM HOME
Portland Telegram—Efforts will be made in some of the leading Portland churches to raise funds to complete the pledge given by the churches and other organizations in this city toward building a unit of the Children's Farm Home at Corvallis, mothered by the W. C. T. U. and the Women's club of the state. The pledge is for \$25,000 and of this but \$17,500 has yet been collected, and \$6500 is yet to be pledged.

By a \$50,000 grant of the state and by subscriptions already made this Children's Farm Home is possessed of a fine farm of 240 acres four miles north of Corvallis, with eighty acres under plow and with some farm buildings upon it. Beside the farm buildings there are already erected two of the "nurs" buildings, or cottages, each costing \$25,000, and each now housing two or three children, or forty-six children in all. One of these is a boys' cottage, the other is for girls. The Portland cottage is now in course of construction, and the balance of the pledge is needed to complete it and make room for a part of the waiting list.

The Baptist church of the state have pledged to build a 25,000 cottage. Though this is not to be in any way a denominational cottage, it will have a Baptist matron. It is the hope of the mothers of this institution that enough other cottage units will be pledged to make total room for no less than 400 children, the number, it is esti-
