General procedure at the renew-
al of the public hearings next
Monday was discussed by Mr.
Walsh and Chairman Lenroot and
later it was stated that Milton
E. Allen, president of Biggs Na-
tional bank of Washington, prob-
ably would be the first witness
Monday.

Senator Walsh declined to dis-
close the subject matter upon
which he will be questioned, but it
is known that the committee de-
sires to have information from
the records of the bank which
might throw light upon rumors
related to those current in con-
nection with supposed stock
transactions by public officials.

After the examination of Mr.
Allen and Mr. Slomp, the commit-
tee probably will call in its ex-
pert accountants before proceed-
ing with other witnesses. These
accountants have completed their
audit of the books of W. B. Hibbs
& Co., a Washington stock brok-
erage firm, and also of the books
of the former Washington branch
of Engelhardt & Co., a Cleveland
stock brokerage firm.

Senator Walsh also said officials
of the Federal-American National
bank and the Commercial National
bank, both at Washington, would
be summoned in connection with
the testimony given by Mr. Mc-
Lean at Palm Beach that he had
given full checks aggregating one
hundred thousand dollars, drawn
on these banks, and which sub-
sequently were returned to him
unused.

"We shall pursue the inquiry
with respect to those checks,"
Senator Walsh said, "because the
general belief is that this trans-

action never did take place."

Mr. McLean is now in Wash-
ington under subpoena, but the
time he will be called before the
committee has not yet been deter-
mined. Senator Walsh said he had
conferred last Sunday with Wilton
J. Lambert, counsel for Mr. Mc-
Lean. It may be that some further
conferences will be held before
Mr. McLean is asked to appear.

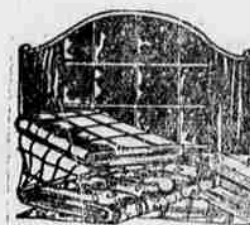
