The club rooms were beautifully decorated with spring flowers and during the afternoon a delicious luncheon was served.

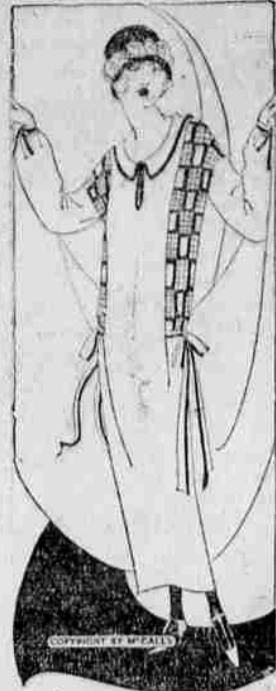
